The regular meeting of the Lansing City Council was called to order by Mayor Gene Kirby at 7:00 p.m.

Roll Call:

Mayor Gene Kirby called the roll and indicated which councilmembers were in attendance.

Councilmembers Present:

OLD BUSINESS:

Consent Calendar: Councilmember Buehler moved to approve the regular meeting minutes of November 5, 2015. Councilmember Studnicka seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

NEW BUSINESS:

Audience Participation: Mayor Kirby called for audience participation and there was none.

Presentation

COUNCIL CONSIDERATION OF AGENDA ITEMS:

Request to Modify Facilities Use Agreement, Rock Creek Ridge, 4th Plat: Councilmember Buehler moved to approve the request to modify the Facilities Use Agreement for Rock Creek Ridge, 4th Plat, to remove the trail system behind the homes and collect \$19,200.00 in park fees. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion.

- Councilmember Studnicka stated why, because "I don't want a trail behind my house", is that where we're
 going with or what.
 - Councilmember Buehler replied because he asked if we could waive the trail, the trail went in a minimal area there. Part of the reason we waived the park fees was because he was going to put the trail in, there is still going to be a sidewalk which will in many areas connect to the trail system.
 - Councilmember Studnicka stated this one will not, according to the map, when I looked at the map.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated I walked over there and it does.
- Councilmember Studnicka stated our trail system will connect with his front 5' sidewalk that he's got there.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski replied ves.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall stated there is a 5 foot sidewalk that will connect to that front sidewalk almost no matter what, but that rear trail would connect to an existing trail.
 - Councilmember Gardner asked the rear trail or are you talking about the sidewalk.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied the rear trail that would be in the back, or not be in the back, depending on what you guys do, that would end up connected to another piece of the trail system.
 - Councilmember Gardner replied but the 5 foot sidewalk is going to connect.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandal replied yes, that will connect to another 5 foot sidewalk.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated that runs into the trail system.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied yes, there is a picture of that and I think it's kind of a bluish house.
- Councilmember McNeill stated the original request from Mr. Reilly was that they do not build the trail in the back anyway and that they put an 8 foot sidewalk in the front, so I mean, we're coming back and still waive the park fee, so in that discussion the last time we talked about this was we didn't want to the waive the park fee. If you weren't going to put the trail in the back then give us the park fee and build your sidewalk in the front; that's what we agreed to. that's what this savs.
 - Councilmember Garvey stated but I think you're going to go back to a standard sidewalk if you collect the park fees.
 - Councilmember Buehler stated it's a sidewalk, a sidewalk is going to be there whether it is 5 feet or 8 feet, it's going to be there. The \$19,200.00 is money we can use to help develop the parks, for example water at Bernard Park, which has always been one of our priorities, we now have money in the parks fund where we can possibly use that to make some of those priority park adjustments.

- Mayor Kirby stated this sidewalk has been there from the get go, from the time that this land was platted.
- Public Work Director John Young replied the plan for this trail behind the houses was in the original master trail plan, it was in the updated trail plan when you just finished the updated comprehensive plan. It connects to a trail that was built as part of Rock Creek Estates, 2nd Plat, with the knowledge that this was going to go forward through here, and while it would temporarily connect back to the sidewalk, the plan is for it to connect, eventually, to more trail that goes to 147th street when the Ryan property develops.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated but it doesn't hook up to the Ryan property.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied at this moment, because they wanted to connect it to a sidewalk.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated but in order for it to connect to the Ryan property it has to go over the creek.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied no, it stays on the South side of the creek.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated but those properties are developed already.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied no, the Ryan property is not developed.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated but it doesn't butt up against the Ryan property
 - Public Work Director John Young replied the Plat does and Tract C that this trail is in butts up against the Ryan property.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated but then you have to cross the creek.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied no, it stays on the South side of the range.
- Mayor Kirby stated let's just say it's waived, this back trail, is the City obligated at some point in the future to put it in.
 - Public Work Director John Young responded if the Ryan property is developed and that developer builds their section of the trail, this would be a gap, and I'm sure that somebody would ask the City to fill that gap. You're not going to do it for \$19,200.00, that's less than half of what the contractor bid to build this trail on this current contract that Reilly has.
 - Mayor Kirby stated so we could be obligated depending on the Ryan property.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied yes, depending on what happens in the future, what future councils want to do.
- Councilmember Pawlowski stated this trail currently goes behind those houses connects back up with the sidewalk and so if you're walking on it, you leave the trail, go down the trail, you come back, you go back up on the sidewalk. They are accessing the property from MG's property, which borders here, and then there's two other properties other here, so depending on how Ryan's property is developed, you can draw the trail at any place anywhere, it will hook up down on Willow with their sidewalk, but putting this trail in is not necessary for any other part of our trail system.
 - Mayor Kirby stated I just want to be sure that in 10 years or 15 years when the Ryan property, if and when, somebody comes back and says "hey you should've put the trail in and you didn't".
 - Public Work Director John Young stated you'll be stuck with a 5 foot sidewalk and not a trail.
 - Mayor Kirby stated I just want to be sure everybody knows what could happen down the road.
 - Councilmember Buehler stated I have no issue with it. If we want to have him put the trail in, I'm ok, I'll withdraw my motion.
- Councilmember McNeill stated let's go over the choices. If this decision then makes Reilly responsible for what he said was going to be quite an expensive endeavor, way more than what he thought.
 - Councilmember Buehler stated way more than the \$48,000.00 that he projected.
 - Councilmember McNeill stated right. We had a lot of folks on his side for even waiving the park fee and not even having to put that in and just putting the 8 foot sidewalk in the front. Dave, I know you were kind of in favor.
- Councilmember Trinkle asked if they develop the Ryan property, down the road, Gilman road comes through there, correct. And until we do something with Gilman that could sit there; I mean, would we connect the trail from Ryan's property over or are we going to the closest place to hook the trail which would be down where Andi's talking.

- Public Work Director John Young replied well again your transportation plan, in your comprehensive plan, shows a route from Gilman would be North of this drainage. The trail South of this drainage that goes up through there, and the whole idea, the reason Gilman hasn't been built is the Council some years ago decided to wait and let that happen, let that developer build it when it happened, when they develop it. It would be the same thing with that piece of the trail as it would be with Gilman Road. That's something in the future that your comprehensive plan shows, that doesn't necessarily mean it's going to happen, we can't tell you what time frame, and we don't know what future councils are going to do. But that's what we just went through the whole exercise for the comprehensive plan; in those parts where the transportation plan which included Gilman, and the trail plan which includes this piece of trail.
 - Councilmember Trinkle stated if you're looking at it from 2 connection points, I'm to understand there's 2 possible places we could hook the property up to the trails, correct.
 - Public Work Director John Young asked which property are you talking about.
 - Councilmember Trinkle stated Rock Creek would go across, down by Willow and hook into the Ryan property, is that what I'm to understand.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied right now there is an existing trail piece in Rock Creek Estates 2nd Plat that this would hook to. One end of that butts up against a City property; we've got a primitive trail across it, and the City has not done any improvements on it, but there is a primitive trail there, it hooks to Willow and goes across the drainage. That trail is on the North side of that drainage and that crosses over, it goes behind 5 houses on Willow and beside 2 houses, so there's like 7 houses that that is behind. That was put in before the houses; those were not the last houses to go into that subdivision. This trail, if it is built like it is supposed to be built according to the plan, would continue across the Ryan property on the South side of that same drainage all the way to 147th street. That is if the plan is followed.
 - Councilmember Trinkle asked where would it go from 147, would it go in front of the Ryan property, down to over here, the other housing area.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied ves. it would intersect with a trail along 147th street that's on the master plan.
 - Councilmember Trinkle stated so we'd have to get Gilman in and 147th. And we'd have to get Ryan's property developed.
- Public Work Director John Young stated and that's the whole reason we do these plans, so you can plan ahead and not miss out on building the pieces on our way to get there.
 - o Councilmember Gardner stated the \$48,000.00 that was originally budgeted for, you're saying now it's going to cost a lot more than that, is that what Reilly was saying.
 - Public Work Director John Young stated it appears that they left out, the designer or Reilly's, left out some stabilization. For instance, the Angel Falls Villas Trail, they built the North part of the Angel Falls Trail, they spent \$111,000.00 there, \$27,000.00 of that was for stabilization. They had that included in their bid. They spread that \$111,000.00 over 24 lots and we're talking about 42 or so. It looks like we didn't know what the designer had in mind at the time, apparently the contractor thinks that it's, even though he bid \$48,000.00, he believes it's not enough, I guess; that's my understanding of it anyway.
- Councilmember McNeill stated it sounds to me like your recommendation is to basically continue to have them build the trail, but that wasn't the first recommendation.
 - Public Work Director John Young stated if I were to make a recommendation I would say yes, that's what's been the idea all along. It was still good in Reilly's, in this developers, opinion when they turned in the plans and signed the Facilities Use Agreement and put up the Bond to guarantee it would be done. There could be something in between; I guess as a business person sitting in your shoes, I wouldn't give it up for \$19,200.00.
- Councilmember Buehler stated they were willing to give it for nothing 2 weeks ago.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied you guys are the ones making the policy, I have no vote.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked was Mr. Reilly invited to come to the meeting tonight. Was Mike invited to come to the meeting tonight?
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied he was the one who submitted the request and I told him I would put it on the agenda.

- Councilmember Gardner stated if that trail is put in how long does it sit there before people are able to use it, or how long before it connects up with something else where people can actually use it. Do we have to wait for the Ryan property to be developed before people use it?
 - Public Work Director John Young responded no, the way they designed it, actually, instead of just dead ending it, they showed that connection back to the sidewalk system, so as soon as those houses are built on that side of the street, there will be an actual loop that you can make there. Eventually that would just be something that had a connection, but it would go on across the property on over to Ryan's. That was the whole plan, and that's the reason they put it there, so it just wouldn't be a dead end.
- Councilmember Gardner asked so either way there won't be a dead end there whether they use the sidewalk or whether they use the trail.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied right. The way it's shown now, if they build it, the way it's shown on the plans that you guys approved, yes, you could do a loop there.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated if you walk on the sidewalk you can walk to 147th street too.
 - Councilmember Gardner replied that's what I'm saying, you can do it either way.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski interjected you can do that now.
 - Councilmember Gardner stated the car traffic and foot traffic, there would be no car traffic if there was a trail.
 - Public Work Director John Young stated and in fact as soon as a few more homes are built in the 3rd phase, there will be an 8 foot connection all the way over to the intersection with the high school, but it will all be in front.
- Councilmember Garvey asked how far would it be from the sidewalk to the trail if we put in the trail, distance wise.
 - Public Work Director John Young asked where they run parallel.
 - Councilmember Garvey replied ves.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated 1 lot.
 - Public Work Director John Young replied it would be whatever the depth of those lots are plus about half of the depth of Tract C.
- Councilmember Pawlowski stated part of the problem that Mike brought to us was in 3 places along there the grade is such that they have to run it right up along the property line. And that's his concern. Did we ever, Gregg, did you ever find out do we, who is responsible for the up-keep of the trail according to the Facilities Use Agreement.
 - City Attorney Greg Robinson replied if it goes in the back and in reading the documents, is that the home owners association would take care of that. If it goes in front and it's a sidewalk it becomes the property owner's responsibility to clear snow and also pay for any concrete that could be damaged over the years.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated so the existing trail that is behind those houses on Willow that's cracked and stuff, the home owners association is supposed to be repairing that now.
 - City Attorney Greg Robinson replied I can't speak to that, I haven't look at those documents; but my understanding is if it's the same proposal as this one, which it was explained to me that it is the same proposal that was used in this one, that would be yes.
 - Public Work Director John Young stated that's similar to Wyndham Hills trail. The home owners association, the same developer put that in, and they've been taking care of the portion on their property, on the home owner's association property, since it was put in.
- Mayor Kirby stated we have a motion to approve the request to modify the Facilities Use Agreement for Rock Creek Ridge, 4th Plat, to remove the trail system behind the homes and collect \$19,200.00 in park fees.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski asked can we designate that \$19,200.00 specifically to the water line.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied that would be done during budget time.
- Mayor Kirby stated we have a motion, it's been seconded, we've had discussion.

The motion was approved, with Councilmembers Studnicka, Gardner, and McNeill voting against the motion.

Replacement of Pull-Type Rotary Mower: Councilmember McNeill moved to approve the bid of Heritage Tractor for a John Deere MX8 pull-type rotary mower in the amount of \$6,770.00 from fund 80, Equipment Reserve, 80-010-43301 (\$10,230.00 less than the amount set aside). Councilmember Studnicka seconded the motion.

- Councilmember Pawlowski stated it says we got a bid for 1 thing and then we're adding \$1,124.00 because it's the best value for the City over the long term. I know nothing about mowers, so my question is how long will this last, and what do we consider the long term.
 - Councilmember Gardner asked the life expectancy of it.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski replied yeah.
 - Public Works Director John Young stated we would expect it to last between 10 and 15 years. We would expect the John Deere mower to last considerably longer than the other, just because of the type of construction and because of experiences we've had with it. I'm confident that it will, and so is the Street Division, that it will last longer than any of the other items.
 - Councilmember Gardner stated I am confident that John Deere puts out the best equipment, I know that.
- Public Works Director John Young replied it has a different construction of the deck, and if you look at the picture of the old one in there you see what happens to them; it is much stronger and is also they designed that deck in a curved shape, a domed shape, which adds additional strength to it and also helps to shed the chaff off it and stuff; it's just a better design.
 - Councilmember Gardner stated you say it will last 10 to 15 years, what would you guess before you have to start making any repairs on it.
 - Public Works Director John Young replied we'll run this probably 8 years before anything unless you hit something.
 - Mayor Kirby stated these are guesses, you don't know how you're going to use it.
 - o Public Works Director John Young stated we'll replace the blades, there will be minor things, you'll have hydraulic leaks from time to you, but you don't get into the trip box or anything really major for 10 to 15 years.
- Councilmember Trinkle asked is there an extended warranty or anything with this.
 - o Public Works Director John Young stated no, they don't do extended warranties because too many people take them out and run them over boulders.
 - Councilmember Trinkle replied what are they going to warranty for us?
 - Street Division Superintendent Jeff Focht replied the standard warranty is for 1 year and the gear box is 5, and that's on all of them.
 - o Public Works Director John Young stated that's across the board, doesn't matter which one you buy, that's about the same.
- Mayor Kirby stated that's a standard warranty and I will vouch for John Deere having strong decks, they do build a better deck.
 - Street Division Superintendent Jeff Foch stated we've had the one now we've had for 11 years.
- Councilmember Garvey asked the tractor that you use for this unit, do you use that tractor for other things besides just the mower or is it exclusively for the mower.
 - Street Division Superintendent Jeff Focht replied the mower and the Kubota tractor goes for different things.
 - Councilmember Garvey stated so you disconnect the mower and go use it for other things.

The motion was unanimously approved.

2015 Wastewater Rate Study: Councilmember Pawlowski moved to approve Ordinance No. 956: An Ordinance Adopting the Financial Plan and User Charge Rate Schedule for Residential and Commercial Customers in the City of Lansing, County of Leavenworth, State of Kansas. Councilmember Gardner seconded the motion.

City Administrator Tim Vandall stated we'd spoken a little bit at the work session about doing this from 2016 to 2019 and then in 2019 re-evaluating. The way the ordinance is written it does have it until 2020, so I don't know if we want to add that into the motion from 2016 until 2019 then we remove the 2020.

Councilmember Gardner withdrew his second. Councilmember Pawlowski withdrew her motion.

- Councilmember Gardner asked does it have to done tonight or do we put it in the ordinance and vote again.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied we'd be able to do it tonight as long as we just state approval from 2016 to 2019.

Councilmember Pawlowski moved to approve Ordinance No. 956: Adopting the Financial Plan and User Charge Rate Schedule for Residential and Commercial Customers for the Sewer bills through 2019. Councilmember Gardner seconded the motion.

- Councilmember Studnicka asked Tony, clarify for me, based on our work session and everything, we're basing the Lansing Correctional Facility will chip in how many thousands of dollars, what was budgeted.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied we are budgeting for them to pay a flat rate of \$56,000.00 per month.

The motion was unanimously approved.

Appointment to the Leavenworth County Fire District No. 1 Joint Board: Councilmember Pawlowski moved to appoint Tony McNeill, Jesse Garvey, and Mayor Gene Kirby to the Leavenworth County Fire District No. 1 Joint Board. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion.

- Councilmember Pawlowski stated I'd like to nominate Tony and Jesse to be on the Fire Board.
 - Mayor Kirby stated you have to be able to make this meeting.
 - Councilmember Buehler asked when is the meeting.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski replied December 14th.
 - Mayor Kirby replied December 14, 2015 and it's at night. This isn't one of those things where you go "oh jeez I forgot I can't be there that night. Dave and Don have done it for a number of years and I haven't heard them say they don't want to do it again, but it's the council's discretion.
- Councilmember McNeill stated the motion isn't to pick 2, it's to allow the Mayor and 2.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated I'm making the motion to nominate Tony and Jesse to go and be our Fire Board Representatives.
 - Mayor Kirby stated this says and I'm going to read what it says here a motion to appoint Gene Kirby and 2 Councilmembers to the Joint Fire District Board when they will meet, ok.
- Councilmember McNeill replied we're just making a motion to appoint Mayor Gene Kirby and 2 councilmembers.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated you need to nominate 2 people.





- 4. Willingness to attend board meetings on the 2nd Thursday of every other month This hasn't changed, still willing \$\frac{1}{2}\$

Mike Williams serves as the USD 469 representative on the Lansing Parks and Recreation Advisory Board. His appointment will expire on December 31, 2015. When it was time to advertise for the other positions on the PRAB that were expiring, I contacted School District Superintendent Randy Bagby to ensure that the district was comfortable with having Mike Williams to continue serving in that capacity. Dr. Bagby informed me that as long as the PRAB and the City were happy with his service that he was comfortable with Mike Williams to continue to serve as their representative. The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board recommended his reappointment at the November meeting.

When Gamble's Crossing was platted, it incorporated an existing permanent drainage easement that had been dedicated in 1997 across the new lots 6 and 7. When the final Public Improvements for the subdivision were designed, it was determined that for engineering reasons the drainage easement and drainage improvements needed to be relocated. A new permanent drainage easement sufficient for construction and maintenance of the actual needed improvements was dedicated to the city by the developer. The old existing easement is not needed and, if allowed to remain, would interfere with the siting of homes.

Action: A motion to adopt Ordinance No. 957: An ordinance vacating a permanent drainage easement across Lots 6 and 7, Gamble's Crossing.



ORDINANCE NO. 957

AN ORDINANCE VACATING A PERMANENT DRAINAGE EASEMENT OVER LOTS 6 AND 7, GAMBLE'S CROSSING

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS:

Section 1. The previously platted permanent drainage easement which was originally dedicated on October 2, 1997, and recorded with the Leavenworth County, Kansas, Register of Deeds in Book 743, Page 62, is no longer of use and has been replaced by a permanent drainage easement dedicated on May 2, 2015, and recorded with the Leavenworth County, Kansas, Register of Deeds as Document No. 2015R03622. The new permanent drainage easement is suitable for current conditions and there is no foreseeable need to retain the **older** existing permanent drainage easement; and

Pursuant to K.S.A. 14-423, be it ordained by the Governing Body of the city of Lansing, Kansas, that the following described utility easement be vacated:


A 20.00 foot wide tract of land in the Northeast One-Quarter of Section 24, Township 09 South, Range 22 East in the city of Lansing, Leavenworth County, Kansas, being a part of the abandoned Lansing Brighton Railroad Right-of-Way and a part of Lots 4 and 5, Block 3, Gambles 3rd Addition, the centerline of which being described as follows:


Commencing at the Southwesterly corner of Lot 54 as platted in Carriage Hill Subdivision; thence Northeasterly on the Southerly line of said Subdivision and on a curve to the left having a radius of 71620 feet, an initial tangent bearing of North 65°59'12" East, a central angle of 5°28'44" and an arc length of 6849 feet to the Point of Beginning of the above-described centerline; thence South 29°29'32" East a distance of 4.13 feet to a point; thence South 86°00'12" East a distance of 10808 feet to a point; thence South 72°39'02" East a distance of 272.00 feet to the Point of Termination, except that part in Gamble Street and except that part in the abandoned Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad Right-of-Way.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after the publication thereof unless one or more interested parties files a written protest in the Office of the City Clerk of the city of Lansing, Kansas, before the expiration of such time.

1 Introduction and Summary

This section will discuss the Traffic Engineering Assistance Program (TEAP) administered by the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT), the application by the City of Lansing, Kansas describing existing conditions issues, along with a high-level overview of the recommended strategies to address the issues presented.

1.1 TEAP OVERVIEW

TEAP is administered by KDOT and provides federal funds to local municipalities and counties that have traffic engineering needs but do not typically have the staff or funds to investigate the issues. These funds are generally used on roadways and intersections that are not state routes addressed by KDOT staff.

1.2 SUMMARY

This TEAP Study provided an extensive review of the signing and pavement marking on the public, and some private, roads surrounding the existing Lansing School District Elementary School, Middle School, and High School as of June 2015. Extensive recommended signing modifications are included within the report both to bring the signs into conformance with national standards, and also to improve signing consistency and focus drivers' attention on important aspects of the transportation network surrounding each school.

As part of the study, a review of a proposed crosswalk south of the Elementary School on W Mary Street near W Kay Street was conducted. This study recommends a crosswalk at this intersection, with signing, pavement markings, and physical modifications of W Mary Street which will influence driver behavior. As part of this study, a previous traffic study conducted on W Mary Street at W Kay Street in 2008, which did not recommend a crosswalk at this location, was thoroughly critiqued.



2 Existing Issues Description

The City of Lansing Public Works Director, Mr. John Young, submitted an application to KDOT requesting a traffic study be performed at schools in the existing Lansing School District in Lansing Kansas including the existing High school, Middle School, and Elementary School to determine whether the existing signage and pavement markings are appropriate. The problem statement read as follows:

"Existing High School will be utilized as Junior High School beginning August 2015. Existing Middle School will be utilized as Elementary School beginning August 2015. Community wishes to make sure appropriate traffic engineered school signing/marking is in place on adjacent streets at both locations before the changes in use take place."

During the in-person meeting with the City of Lansing it was clarified that the existing High School will not be used as a Junior High until August 2016, not August 2015 as described in the application.

Additional information from the study application and from a phone call with the Public Works Director provided additional concerns regarding pedestrian safety at specific intersections as well as parking spillover from the schools to adjacent residential neighborhoods during after school activities.

This study will focus on evaluating the existing geometric configurations at the schools and adjacent residential roadways, traffic signage, pavement markings, reduced school speed limits, posted speed limits and existing crosswalk locations. In addition, a review of the existing city ordinances and state statues will be conducted to determine school zone designations and any active status of school zone violation fines.

2.1 OVERVIEW OF AREA

The study area consists of schools within the existing USD 469 school district in Lansing, KS. This includes Lansing High School, Lansing Middle School and Lansing Elementary School. The City of Lansing, KS is located in Leavenworth County and is considered part of the Kansas City metropolitan area. Lansing is located approximately 30 miles northwest of Kansas City, KS. The City population in 2013 was estimated to be 11,642 (United States Census Bureau, 2015).

The existing Lansing High School is located to the east of K-7/US-73 on the south east area of the City. Land use surrounding the High School is residential.

The Middle School and Elementary School are located on the west side of K-7/US73. The Elementary School is located directly south of the Middle School. The land use surrounding the Middle School is residential, while the land use surrounding the Elementary School is a mixture of low density residential and undeveloped forest. The undeveloped forest is located west and southwest of the elementary school.




Figure 1 - TEAP Study Area (USD 469), Lansing, KS

Figure 1 shows an aerial map of the study area. The areas highlighted in red will be analyzed for signs and pavement markings and those in orange will be reviewed for parking spillover.

2.2 REVIEW OF PREVIOUS STUDIES

Related studies conducted in this area were provided by the City of Lansing. Two studies were reviewed in order to identify any previous recommendations which may have impacted the study area.

One of the primary resources used for evaluations within this report, and previous reports, is the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD). The MUTCD is the national standard for all traffic control devices installed on any street or highway open to public travel in accordance with federal law. Traffic control devices consist of signs, pavement markings, and other devices used to regulate, warn, or guide traffic on streets or highways. The current edition is the 2009 MUTCD. The MUTCD is freely available in electronic format at *mutcd.fhwa.dot.gov*.

2.2.1 TEAP Speed Limit Study from 2007

The first study reviewed was a TEAP study that was performed by Bucher, Willis & Ratliff in the year 2007. This was a Speed Limit Study to "Identify proper speed limits along DeSoto Road, McIntyre Road, Gilman Road east of K-7/US-73, Gilman Road/Canyon View/Cottonwood/Willow, East Mary Street, 4H Road, Ida Street, and 155th Street in Lansing, Kansas" (Bucher, Willis & Ratliff, 2007). The existing speed limits were identified and recommended speeds along these roadways were determined using the 85th percentile speed of free flowing traffic along with engineering judgment in accordance to the MUTCD guidelines.

The following regulatory speed limits were recommended:

- Increase from 35 mph to 40 mph at Desoto Road, McIntyre Road and Gilman Road east of K-7/US-73 Highway.
- Increase from 35 mph to 45 mph on East Mary Street east of the K-7/US-73 Highway while
 maintaining the school zone speed limit at the school on East Mary Street, and add a 35 mph
 speed limit west of the school for eastbound traffic.
- No changes to the speed limits on Gilman Road/Canyon View/Cottonwood/Willow and at 4H Road.
- Increase from 25 mph to 35 mph on Ida Street.

2.2.2 Traffic Study - Crosswalk Evaluation on W Mary Street at W Kay Street from 2008 The second traffic study reviewed was a pedestrian crossing evaluation for the City of Lansing that was prepared by Wilson & Company. The study was to "Evaluate the feasibility and safety of a proposed crosswalk on West Mary Street at West Kay Street in proximity to Lansing Elementary School" (Wilson & Company, 2008). The study was requested by residents from the multifamily dwelling units located along Francis Lane to provide a more direct route for pedestrians and students walking from the residential areas to the elementary school.

At the time of the study, there was a pedestrian crosswalk on the east leg of the intersection of W Mary Street & Bittersweet Street, and another pedestrian crosswalk on the east leg of W Mary Street & S Main Street. These crossing locations were out-of-the-way of reasonably direct walking routes to the Elementary School from local residential units. It is likely that students and pedestrians were crossing W Mary Street at the shortest possible path between their origin and destination.

The study along W Mary Street reviewed the crash history, driver speeds both during and outside of school hours, existing signing, and sight distance at the proposed crossing near W Kay Street. The crash history aspect of this report will not be discussed further as there was no pattern of crashes identified by the 2008 study. There were no recommendations for modified signing, but the study recorded the existing signing at the time, which appears to closely match what was found in 2014. Signing will be discussed later in this report.

The 2008 Report's information on driver speeds along W Mary Street and the sight distance study for the proposed crosswalk deserve further discussion as they directly affect the current study. The entirety of the 2008 Traffic Study concerning the W Mary Street crosswalk at W Kay Street is included in the appendix for reference, but applicable parts of the study will be quoted and referenced extensively in this report.

2.2.2.1 2008 Traffic Study Report Driver Speed Data in Relation to School Zone Speeds
The 2008 study recorded 64 hours of speed data from 2:00 p.m. on Monday, December 1, 2008 to 6:00 a.m. on Thursday, December 4, 2008. Of this data, three time periods were more closely analyzed and are shown in Table 1.

Typically when 85th percentile speeds are used as guidance when setting regulatory speed limits, free-flowing traffic is used (Federal Highway Administration, 2009, p. 2B.13). As such, only the first vehicle in a platoon, or group of vehicles, should be counted toward the 85th percentile speed. The following drivers were not free flowing as they were restricted by the speed of drivers in front of them. Typical times when free flow speeds are observed outside of the peak hours. Mid-morning hours and mid-afternoon hours are often conducive for obtaining free-flow speeds of drivers. It's unknown if the 2008 Traffic Study only counted free-flowing vehicles, or if all vehicles were counted. As a result, the actual speeds during off-peak hours with free-flowing vehicles only may be higher than depicted in Table 1.

The 85th percentile speed is used in traffic engineering as a determining factor in setting regulatory speed limits. According to the Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE) "The most widely accepted method by state and local agencies is to set the limit at or below the speed at which 85 percent of the traffic is moving.' The 85th percentile speed is how drivers 'vote with their feet.' Studies have shown that 'crash rates are lowest at around the 85th percentile speed.'" (Institute of Transportation Engineers). The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) 2009 provides guidance stating that "When a speed limit within a speed zone is posted, it should be within 5 mph of the 85th percentile speeds for free-flowing traffic." (Federal Highway Administration, 2009, p. 2B.12.12). The speed data from 2008 shows that drivers are following the posted speed limit of 35 mph very well, as the 85th percentile speed of 34.0 mph is under the regular 35 mph posted speed.

Drivers do not appear to be slowing down to stay within the school speed limit of 20 mph with an average speed during this time period of 26 mph. In fact, the average speed only decreased 1.0 to 1.5 mph from their non-school time average travel speeds, even though the speed limit was lowered by 15 mph during school arrival and dismissal.

2.2.2.2 2008 Traffic Study Report Sight Distance Analysis for Proposed Crosswalk Location
The 2008 Traffic Study Report measured sight distances at the proposed pedestrian crosswalk location.




Figure 2 - 2008 Traffic Study Report's Sight Distance Evaluation for Proposed Pedestrian Crossing (W Mary Street & W Kay Street)

Their measured sight distances are reproduced in Figure 2.

The sight distance analysis section from the 2008 Traffic Study Report is reproduced below:

"Sight Distances were measured at the proposed pedestrian crosswalk location on December 4, 2008. Figure 5 [Figure 2 in this report] shows the measured sight distances from the north and south sides of W. Mary Street at the proposed crossing location. From the south side of W. Mary Street, the sight distances were 670 feet to the east and 250 feet to the west. From the north side of the [sic] W. Mary Street, the sight distances were 615 feet to the east and 340 feet to the west.

Using rectified aerial photography from the City of Lansing, a curve was best fit to identify the approximate design speed for W. Mary Street. Based on the current geometry, it appears that W. Mary Street is designed to 40mph criteria. A Policy on Geometric Design of Highways and Streets, 2004 Edition, AASHTO [2] recommends a Decision Sight Distance of 330 feet on a road with a design speed of 40 mph. It is observed that the available sight distance to the west of the proposed pedestrian crosswalk is inadequate from the south side of the [sic] W. Mary Street and the available sight distance from the north side of W Mary Street is 10 feet more than the minimum acceptable decision sight distance. Although convenient, this proposed crossing location would not be a safe location to install a pedestrian crossing, as the vehicles traveling eastbound would not have the sufficient decision sight distance to decelerate safely to a full stop." Source: (Wilson & Company, 2008) Emphasis in the original.

The 2008 Report goes on to recommend an additional pedestrian crosswalk on the west leg of the intersection of W Mary Street and what the 2008 Report incorrectly refers to as Main Street, which is actually Center Drive. S Main Street is actually US-73/K-7/S Main Street and is a four-lane divided

highway located approximately 500 feet east of Center Drive. The 2008 Report did not investigate any additional traffic calming techniques at the proposed pedestrian crossing location at W Kay Street.

After reviewing the 2008 Traffic Study Report, it was determined there were some incorrect as well as overly conservative uses of engineering methodologies and applications during the sight distance review for the proposed pedestrian crossing at W Mary Street & W Kay Street.

The first issue in the 2008 Report is the use of decision sight distance as the method for determining the suitability of a pedestrian crossing as opposed to stopping sight distance. For evaluation of this, a discussion on sight distances, stopping sight distances, and decision sight distances is needed.

American Association of State Highway and Transportation Official's (AASHTO) "A Policy on Geometric Design of Highways and Streets," commonly referred to as the "Green Book" provides guidance on which type of sight distance should be evaluated and how to evaluate the sight distance. The 2008 Report used the most recent Green Book at the time, which was the 2004 Green Book. The current edition of the Green Book is the 2011 edition. Both the 2004 and the 2011 Green Book will be quoted as applicable.

The 2004 Green Book states the following about stopping sight distances:

"Sight distance is the length of the roadway ahead that is visible to the driver. The available sight distance on a roadway should be sufficiently long to enable a vehicle traveling at or near the design speed to stop before reaching a stationary object in its path. Although greater lengths of visible roadway are desirable, the sight distance at every point along a roadway should be at least that needed for a below-average driver or vehicle to stop.

Stopping sight distance is the sum of two distances: (1) the distance traversed by the vehicle from the instant the driver sights an object necessitating a stop to the instant the brakes are applied; and (2) the distance needed to stop the vehicle from the instant brake application begins. These are referred to as the brake reaction distance and braking distance, respectively." Source: (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, 2004, p. 110)

The 2004 Green Book recommends a brake reaction time of 2.5 seconds for stopping sight distance calculations which "should be large enough to include the reaction times needed by nearly all drivers under most highway conditions," "encompasses the capabilities of most drivers, including those of older drivers," and "exceeds the 90th percentile of reaction time for all drivers". "The need for greater reaction time in the most complex situation encountered on the roadway, such as those found at multiphase at-grade intersection and at ramp terminals on through roadways, can be found later in this chapter in the section on 'decision sight distance.'" Source: (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, 2004, p. 111).

The 2004 Green Book also discusses the use of decision sight distance, the start of which section still refers to stopping sight distance:

"Stopping sight distances are usually sufficient to allow reasonably competent and alert drivers to come to a hurried stop under ordinary circumstances. However, these distances are often inadequate when drivers must make complex or instantaneous decisions, when information is difficult to perceive, or when unexpected or unusual maneuvers are required. Limiting sight distances to those needed for stopping may preclude drivers from performing evasive maneuvers, which often involve less risk and are otherwise preferable to stopping. ...

Decision sight distance is the distance needed for a driver to detect an unexpected or otherwise difficult-to-perceive information source or condition in a roadway environment that may be visually cluttered, recognize the condition or its potential threat, select an appropriate speed and path, and initiate and complete the maneuver safely and efficiently. Because decision sight distance offers drivers additional margin for error and affords them sufficient length to maneuver their vehicles at the same or reduced speed, rather than to just stop, its values are substantially greater than stopping sight distance." Source: (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, 2004, p. 115).

The 2008 Traffic Study Report uses decision sight distance, with Avoidance Maneuver A, which is a stop on a rural road which equates to 3.0 seconds of pre-maneuver time (similar to perception reaction time in this case). Using the 3.0 second value within the decision sight distance equation includes an extra 0.5 seconds of perception reaction/pre-maneuver time than is required using the stopping sight distance value of 2.5 seconds.

Decision sight distance, as used and applied in the 2008 Traffic Study Report is incorrect, and stopping sight distance or a different analysis method is more appropriate. Drivers will be alert to the possible presence of pedestrians due to the pedestrian warning signs. Drivers need to come to a complete stop at a marked pedestrian crosswalk. Drivers do not need to make complex decisions or perform unusual or evasive maneuvers when confronted with a pedestrian crossing on a two-lane road, they only need to stop.

The second issue is with the use of the design speed of 40 mph as determined from aerial photography, rather than the posted speed limit. If W Mary Street actually was designed with a 40 mph design speed using 2004 Green Book recommendations it wouldhave a stopping sight distance sufficient for drivers travelling 40 mph to come to a complete stop if an object was spotted in the road ahead. "Stopping sight distance is provided continuously along each highway or street so that drivers have a view of the roadway ahead that is sufficient to allow drivers to stop. The provision of stopping sight distances at all locations along each highway or street, including intersection approaches, is fundamental to intersection operation" (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, 2004, p. 650).

A 40 mph design speed will have a stopping sight distance longer than a 35 mph posted speed limit stopping sight distance. However, this is somewhat irrelevant, as it is unknown from the available data when W Mary Street was designed and the design speed and guidelines that were used at the time. What is relevant is that drivers should not be travelling at 40 mph on a 35 mph posted regulatory speed limit. In fact, the data collected as part of the 2008 Traffic Study Report shows that even the 85th

percentile of drivers are only travelling 34.0 mph (Table 1) back in 2008. Speed data provided by the City of Lansing collected in 2014 showed that the 85th percentile on the east leg of the intersection of W Mary Street & Bittersweet Street (approximately 1,000 ft to the west of W Kay Street) is 36 mph with an average speed of 27.99 mph.

An inferred 40 mph design speed on W Mary Street, as used and applied in the 2008 Traffic Study Report is incorrect as well as overly conservative, and using the posted regulatory speed limit of 35 mph with supporting recorded driver travel speeds is more fitting.

Using even these two corrected assumptions in the 2008 Traffic Study Report would have resulted in using the stopping sight distance for 35 mph as the criteria for implementing a pedestrian crosswalk. The design value for stopping sight distance at 35 mph with no grade to the roadway is 250 feet (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, 2004, p. 112). As measured in the 2008 TEAP Report, 250 feet of sight distance or more was available for all sight lines at the proposed crosswalk location.

2.2.3 Speed Data from 2014 Provided by City of Lansing

In addition to the two studies reviewed, the City of Lansing provided a table of recorded driver speeds through the City in 2014 along with a map of those recorded locations. Details about specific driver speeds at selected locations are shown in Table 2, while Figure 3 shows a map with more precise geographic locations of the recorded speed data. It's highly unlikely the speed data represents off-peak free-flowing vehicles only, so the information about 85th percentile speeds should be used with care.

The review team acknowledges the Lansing Lion paw print pavement markings found at the High School (Figure 32). As school property is primarily parking areas or driving aisles, the property owner currently has some leeway in conforming to the MUTCD (Federal Highway Administration, 2009, pp. I-1). This may change in future editions of the MUTCD. The review team found that while the Lansing Lion paw prints are non-standard pavement markings, they were not overly distracting or confusing when driving slowly through the High School driveways and parking lots. In particular, it's likely not worth the expense of removing the paw print pavement markings. The review team suggests the paw print pavement markings located on the High School property not be repainted in the future and to let them fade away.

However, the Lansing Lion paw print pavement markings located on City of Lansing public streets should be removed as the City should be following the MUTCD. Paw print pavement markings were found on Olive Street on the south side of the high school grounds and should be removed.

3.5 PEDESTRIAN CROSSWALK ANALYSIS NEAR THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The City of Lansing and Lansing School District (USD 469) requested during a joint meeting with the study team that an evaluation of a school crossing be conducted as part of the TEAP study. The City staff and Lansing School District staff expressed concerns with students crossing W Mary Street between the intersections of W Mary Street & W Kay Street (south leg) and W Mary Street & Frances Lane. The students are crossing W Mary Street along this section of roadway as it's the most direct path between their residence and the Elementary School and Middle School. During the 2008 Traffic Study Report, the Lansing Heights Apartments at Frances Lane already existed, but there has been an additional apartment complex (Covington Woods Apartments) constructed since 2008. This new apartment complex is located just southeast of the intersection of W Mary Street and W Kay Street (south leg).




Figure 33 - Extra Walking for Apartment-based Students to Elementary School using Existing Crosswalks

The existing crosswalk locations for students to cross W Mary Street are out of the way for students (Figure 33). As part of the 2008 Traffic Study Report it was suggested that a crosswalk be added on the west leg of W Mary Street and Center Drive for students crossing W Mary Street from the Lansing Heights Apartments. This suggested and implemented crosswalk location is an extra distance of 900 feet each way to and from school each day. The students from the new Covington Woods apartments would need to walk to the east leg of the intersection of W Mary Street and Bittersweet Street to cross W Mary Street. The extra walking distance for the students from the Covington Woods Apartments is approximately 1,100 feet.

For the purposes of discussion, it is assumed the average student has to walk an extra 1,000 feet to school because of the available crosswalk locations. The MUTCD sets the walking pace to 3.5 feet per second for crosswalks, although most pedestrians likely walk closer to the previously used 4.0 feet per second. For pedestrians walking an extra 1,000 feet each way to school, this equates to an additional 4 minutes and 45 seconds at 3.5 feet per second. By walking at little quicker at 4.0 feet per second, the additional walking time is approximately 4 minutes and 10 seconds. To put this into perspective for drivers, at 30 mph, for an extra 4 minutes of delay, a driver would have to travel 2 miles out of their way. For an equivalent situation, between the extra distance travelled and the delay incurred, most drivers would be upset, and just take the shorter route, which is what students are doing.

Students are highly unlikely to walk out of their way to the existing crosswalk locations, and are likely to be resentful if the school or parents attempt to force them to do so. This may result in fewer students walking to school, which will only add to the vehicular congestion at the Elementary School, and the associated vehicle emissions from parents driving to pick their students up. Discouraging students from walking to school is a negative result both from a traffic operations and a healthy community viewpoint.

A better solution is to attempt to accommodate, to the extent possible, the route students are likely to walk. Students generally prefer the shortest crossing distance and may not walk as few as 100 feet to cross at a controlled crossing if out of their way. A crosswalk at a controlled location in the vicinity of where students want to cross, and are crossing W Mary Street already, is the place to start. As noted in Section 3.1, Crash Analysis, there was a rear-end, property damage only crash on Wednesday, February 15, 2012 at 7:25 a.m. when one driver yielded to a pedestrian crossing W Mary Street and the following

driver failed to stop in time. Pedestrians are continuing to cross in the area of W Mary Street and W Kay Street (north leg).

The 2008 Traffic Study Report had some concerns about a crossing at this location. During the review of that report, the methodology and assumptions used were found to be incorrect as well as overly conservative and did not take into account the human factors of pedestrians and students. The study also did not evaluate other engineering measures which could be used to supplement a crosswalk.

As discussed in Section 2.2.2.2, 2008 Traffic Study Report Sight Distance Analysis for Proposed Crosswalk Location, a more appropriate methodology to use for determining acceptable sight distances is the Stopping Sight Distance for 35 mph. The posted speed is 35 mph outside of school hours, and the crossing should provide enough sight distance for drivers travelling at that speed to stop for pedestrians in the crossing. The design stopping sight distance for 35 mph is 250 feet (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, 2011, pp. 3-4).

The Stopping Sight Distance methodology may also be conservative for the purposes of a pedestrian crossing. The assumption is that the driver's eye height is 3.5 feet above the roadway, which is understandable. The object height, or what the driver needs to see in order to stop, is assumed to be 2.0 feet tall. The 2011 Green Book goes on to state why a 2.0-foot object height was selected.

"The selection of a 2.00-ft object height was based on research indicating that objects with heights less than 2.00 ft are seldom involved in crashes. Therefore, it is considered that an object 2.00 ft in height is representative of the smallest object that involves risk to drivers. An object height of 2.00 ft is representative of the height of automobile headlights and taillights. Using object heights of less than 2.00 ft for stopping sight distance calculations would result in longer crest vertical curves without a documented decrease in the frequency or severity of crashes. Object height of less than 2.00 ft could substantially increase construction costs because additional excavation would be needed to provide the longer crest vertical curves. It is also doubtful that the driver's ability to perceive situations involving risk of collisions would be increased because recommended stopping sight distances for high-speed design are beyond most drivers' capabilities to detect objects less than 2.00 ft in height." (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, 2011, pp. 3-15)

The 2.00-foot object height was selected because smaller objects are of low risk to drivers, it was not likely cost-effective for construction, happened to be at approximately taillight height, and drivers at high speeds can't see smaller objects that far out. If in the case of a crosswalk, the driver is not travelling at high speeds (typically defined as over 45 mph), and the "object," an actual pedestrian, is taller than 2.00 feet, presumably drivers would be able to see them further away and have time to stop.

At intersections where sight distance is being evaluated for drivers, Intersection Sight Distance is used. For intersection sight distance, the driver's eye height is still assumed to be 3.5 feet above the roadway, but the object height increases. The object height for intersection sight distance is 3.5 feet because it is assumed one driver would need to be able to see the other. Included in this is an allowance for the height of the car above the driver's eye height which helps drivers identify an approaching "object" or vehicle. This suggests that different situations should use different object height assumptions.

Even at age 3, the 10th percentile in height of a female child in America is nearly 2 feet, 11 inches tall (National Center for Health Statistics, 2000). This is not to suggest that a 3 year old child should be crossing a road alone, but only to give an idea of the height of the "object" drivers should be looking for as it is more than 2 feet which is used for stopping sight distance.

Given that the smallest pedestrian or "object" in the crosswalk should be nearly 3 feet tall, and not 2 feet tall as used for stopping sight distance, even meeting the minimum design stopping sight distance with a 2-foot object height for 35 mph should be sufficient sight distance for drivers to stop for pedestrians in a crosswalk.

As a check for the stopping sight distance, the study team returned to the proposed crosswalk site on Thursday, July 23, 2015 with their stopping sight distance equipment. Two 2-foot tall rods supported by 18-inch tall traffic cones represented the objects (Figure 34). The 2-foot tall rods were placed approximately 6 feet west along the roadway from the street light located on the south side of the road. A third rod that was 3.5 feet tall was carried and used to determine the driver's eye height. The distance was then measured with a rolling wheel. The 2-foot tall objects were placed just outside the gutter on the street which represents the first possible location that a conflict between a pedestrian and a vehicle would likely occur.




Figure 35 - Field Observed Sight Distance for Eastbound W Mary Street Approach to Proposed Crosswalk at W Kay Street




Figure 36 - Field Observed Sight Distance for Westbound W Mary Street Approach to Proposed Crosswalk at W Kay Street

The sight distance was measured by walking along W Mary Street in the direction of each approach and looking at the 3.5-foot driver's eye height rod to see if the 2-foot object was still visible. The measured sight distance was the furthest distance that the study team could see from the 3.5-foot driver's eye height with the 2-foot object still visible. The distance between the two rods was then measured along the vehicle path of travel. The resulting sight distances are shown in Figure 35 and Figure 36. Photos from the field determined sight distance study are shown in Figure 37 through Figure 40. The proposed crosswalk was located on the east side of W Kay Street as this location would be suitable for a raised median, and would help keep students out of the path of southbound right turning drivers, who are primarily looking left, and not right, for conflicts.

Figure 39 is particularly interesting as it clearly shows the concrete box that is the restriction on additional sight distance as seen in the field. If a young pedestrian "object" were taller than 2 feet, the sight distance would increase, as drivers would be able to see the pedestrian over the top of the concrete box.

Next, the approach grades were checked. As stopping sight distance at 35 mph on a level roadway is 250 feet, the observed 740 feet of sight distance for westbound would be sufficient, even if a slight downgrade was accounted for. The required stopping sight distance with a correction for grade for westbound drivers will not be calculated. For eastbound drivers, two different methods were used to determine grade. The first was a cell phone digital level application which was laid on the pavement in three locations along the approach. The average downgrade was 2.63 degrees. 2.63 degrees converted to percent grade is 4.6%. The second method involved creating a track on a cell phone which could create a.kmz file that shows location and elevation. This method found that the eastbound downgrade had an average slope of -1.9%, with a maximum slope of -3.1%. Using a very conservative -6% downgrade results in a 35 mph stopping sight distance of 271 feet (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, 2011, pp. 3-5).

The study team also drove the corridor in the eastbound direction along W Mary Street and tested stopping once the 2-foot rod on the south side of the road was visible. The study team had no issues stopping once the 2-foot rod was visible. Additionally, the study team passenger noted that the driver tended to stop before (west of) the intersection of W Mary Street & W Kay Street, as it's not typical that drivers stop in an intersection. The distance from the 2-foot rods to the west side of the intersection is

approximately 70 feet. As there is 340 feet of measured sight distance, and the calculated stopping distance required is 271 feet, which leaves an additional 69 feet of buffer between the driver and the crossing pedestrian. Conveniently, this should allow most eastbound drivers to stop near the entry to the intersection and wait for the pedestrian to cross which would be a natural location for drivers to want to yield.

The study team returned to the proposed crosswalk site on Friday, August 7, 2015 with their radar gun to measure free flowing driver speeds after a brief discussion with KDOT staff who thought it would be prudent to collect the speed data. Free flow driver speeds were collected from 9:20 a.m. to 11:15 a.m. The results of the speed study are shown in Table 6. There were a total of 51 vehicles recorded for eastbound and 81 vehicles recorded for westbound West Mary Street. Typically recorded speeds would be corrected to account for the cosine effect which is an error that occurs when the vehicle is traveling in a different direction than the radio waves from the speed detection device. This results in the radar gun detecting a relative speed rather than the actual speed (Goodson, 1985, p. 1188). However, as we were located on the outside of the curve, drivers were approaching us directly and the speeds do not need to be corrected.

The field measured stopping sight distance study found that there is sufficient sight distance for drivers in both directions of travel along W Mary Street to come to a complete stop before the proposed crosswalk location.

Additionally, adding a raised median with a pedestrian refuge area can improve the safety of a proposed crosswalk on W Mary Street just east of W Kay Street (north leg). "Providing raised medians or pedestrian refuge areas at pedestrian crossings at marked crosswalks has demonstrated a 46 percent reduction in pedestrian crashes. At unmarked crosswalk locations, pedestrian crashes have been reduced by 39 percent. Installing raised pedestrian refuge islands on the approaches to unsignalized intersections has had the most impact reducing pedestrian crashes." Constructing a raised median has been shown to reduce vehicle speeds on the roadway and creates a two-stage crossing for the pedestrians. The pedestrians only need to watch for one direction of vehicle traffic at a time, and then may pause in the middle of the raised median to look for vehicles in the opposite direction of travel (Federal Highway Administration, 2013).

A basic example of a pedestrian refuge island is shown in Figure 41 and Figure 42. The median/refuge islands is preferably 8 feet wide (4 feet minimum) for accommodation of pedestrian comfort and safety. On refuges 6 feet or wider that serve designated pedestrian crossings, detectable warning strips complying with the requirements of the ADA must be installed. As West Mary Street is 35 feet wide,

even allowing the typical two 12-foot wide vehicle travel lanes, the median refuge could be a minimum of 7 feet wide, allowing for two 2-foot wide curbs surrounding the raised median.

The installation of a raised median with pedestrian refuge at the east leg of the intersection of W Mary Street & W Kay Street should still accommodate school buses turning at the intersection at a minimum. During a design phase for the raised median, other vehicle turning movements may need to be checked such as for larger semi-trucks which may be delivering food or equipment to the school. At the same time, it is also possible to post restrictions on bus or truck turning movements if attempting to accommodate a certain vehicle type creates too many compromises in the design or location of the raised median.

5 Pedestrian Crosswalk near the Elementary School Recommendations

A pedestrian crosswalk near the Elementary School is recommended on the east leg of the intersection of W Mary Street & W Kay Street (north leg). There are three parts to the implementation: signing and pavement marking, school crossing guards, and the raised pedestrian median refuge.

The signing and pavement marking recommended for this crosswalk was addressed in the Section 4.1.

An adult school crossing guard is recommended during arrival and dismissal at the Elementary School for the recommended new crosswalk. The adult crossing guard can stop traffic to allow younger school children to cross the street at this location.




Figure 53 - Recommended Raised Median with Pedestrian Refuge at W Mary Street & W Kay Street

A sketch of the recommended raised median with pedestrian refuge is shown in Figure 53. Signing for the median itself would need to be included during the design phase of a raised median, and should include object markers (OM1-1) and Keep Right (R4-7) signs on the nose of each side of the median.

The preliminary median design incorporated a review of the AASHTO School Bus entering and exiting the Elementary School at W Kay Street. In order to accommodate a school bus, the median was narrowed through tapers on the west side of W Mary Street. This design modification was made to keep the crossing location as close as possible to the intersection, without moving the crossing too far east.

The median width at the location of the pedestrian crossing should be a minimum width of 6 feet. During design, consider an offset median crossing so that pedestrians must face oncoming vehicles before completing the crossing.

As part of the design of the crosswalk, the lane widths were modified on the southbound W Kay Street approach to W Mary Street. The existing three lanes are each 12 feet wide, for a total width of 36 feet. It may be helpful to make the two southbound lanes only 10-11 feet wide rather than 12 feet wide so that the northbound receiving lane can be 14-16 feet wide which will help with turning movements.

The estimated cost of constructing a raised median with pedestrian refuge for the crosswalk with the appropriate signing and pavement marking is \$100,000.
