REGULAR MEETING MINUTES August 15, 2019

## Call To Order:

The regular meeting of the Lansing City Council was called to order by Mayor Mike Smith at 7:00 p.m.

## **Roll Call:**

Mayor Mike Smith called the roll and indicated which Councilmembers were in attendance.

## **OLD BUSINESS:**

**Approval of Minutes:** Councilmember Buehler moved to approve the regular meeting minutes of August 1, 2019 as presented. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Audience Participation: Mayor Smith called for audience participation and there was none. Presentations: Briefing from Representative French: State Representative David French spoke to the Council about items going on at the state level. Mr. French handed out his newsletter, highlights put out by the Legislative Research Department, a packet from the Department of Transportation and one about the Lansing Correctional Facility. The Legislative Highlight pamphlet shows what laws have been passed to date. The Legislature's goal each year is to pass a balanced budget and that budget was passed early and ended up saving the taxpayers money. The latest endeavor of the Legislature was to take action on previous KPERS loans. Money was paid back to KPERS and additional funds were added to ensure it is solid going forward. Taxes are rising in Kansas and it is a concern. An attempt was made to get those lowered but the Governor vetoed those bills and there weren't enough votes to override it. The Governors goal this year is focusing on Medicaid expansion. Leaders don't want to tie the State to unknown cost of a program with limited benefits overall. This battle will continue into next year and its possible taxes may increase because of it. Mr. French has spent a lot of time getting updated on State Correctional Facilities. Meetings that have been held within the Lansing Correctional Facility with the Warden and the acting Secretary of Department of Corrections. A staff workshop was conducted, and Mr. French has met with some inmates through the Reaching Out From Within program. The biggest step within the Lansing Correctional Facility has been a pay increase to the Officers because they were frequently losing Officers due to non-competitive salaries.

- Councilmember Pawlowski asked if KPERS was back on track because it is a concern to staff.
  - Mr. French replied everything borrowed from KPERS has been put back in with an additional \$51 million added.

## **COUNCIL CONSIDERATION OF AGENDA ITEMS:**

Resolution No. B-6-19 – Hidden Heroes City: Shaun Moore stated Good evening everyone, my name is Shaun Moore and my partner in crime is what I call her, is Rachel Moyers and she is the current, first of all, she is having some problems with her voice tonight so I am speaking. She is the current Elizabeth Dole Fellow for the State of Missouri and I am the Alumnus for the State of Missouri. Kansas does have a Fellow. She lives out in Junction City and recently had some health problems so she couldn't come here tonight. One of the things that the Elizabeth Dole Foundation does is this Fellows Program that puts Fellows in every state where they can come back home and advocate for our military and veteran caregivers. Those family members that are taking care of our nations wounded veterans. So not professional caregivers but the family caregivers and those caregivers are called Hidden Heroes. So, that is where you get the Hidden Heroes proclamation. We believe that our nation does a really good job supporting our veterans but one of the things we don't do when we see a veteran is see past the veteran, especially if they are wounded mentally, physically or both, we don't see their families. And you have to know that if a veteran is struggling, their family probably is as well. So, we are super excited on behalf of the Elizabeth Dole Foundation as well as both of us. We started a non-profit called Caregivers on the Homefront that is right in your back yard that supports these military and veteran caregivers with support

groups, educational tools so they can better take care of their veterans. A better family life keeps the family together. It also helps in the healing of the veteran. So, is there any veterans, caregivers, family members in the room tonight? Yes ma'am. Thank you for being here. Anyone else? Thank you for being here. We want to make sure that when we have events like this, we see those caregivers because they are often times not seen and I quarantee you they will not ask for help. So, we have to make sure we are asking what they need. So, Rachel and I, our husbands are disabled veterans. Her husband spent time in the Air Force, my husband retired from the Army. They both go to the Leavenworth VA so we spend a lot of time in your state. That is why we are here. We may live on the Missouri side but we do a lot of things in Kansas. We have caregivers that come over to our support groups and our restorative weekends that we have. So please know we are about 20 minutes from your great city and we hope we can do things together to bring out our veteran caregivers to know that we see them. And you all see them by signing this proclamation and we truly appreciate it. Do you have any questions?

Mayor Mike Smith replied we appreciate you coming out and I want to ask the Council to adopt Resolution No. B-6-19.

Councilmember Buehler moved to adopt Resolution No. B-6-19, Councilmember Garvey seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

- Mayor Smith stated thank you ladies for bringing this up to us and coming out here. We really appreciate it.
  - Shaun Moore replied thank you, we truly appreciate it.
    - Mayor Smith responded thank you.
- City Administrator Tim Vandall stated Mike, I think there was a video.
  - o Shaun Moore replied there is, yes, thank you for reminding me.
    - Mayor Smith responded I was looking over there Tim. I wasn't sure.

- Mayor Mike Smith ladies again appreciate you bringing it to us and god bless you for what you're doing because this is something that is so important now this day in age. Thank you for coming out here.
  - Councilmember Pawlowski asked Mike can Sarah get that or Ken can you put that on our 0 website.
    - Public Information Officer Ken Miller it's going to be part of the Council video.

Request for Special Use Permit – More Than 4 Animals – 417 Fairlane Street: Councilmember Trinkle moved to approve the special use permit for 417 Fairlane Street. Councilmember McNeill seconded the motion.

- Councilmember Buehler asked the observed violation is for the barking dog.
  - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr replied it was from that call.
    - Councilmember Buehler asked and it hasn't happened since.
      - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr responded well it had nothing to do with the barking dog. She already has three registered dogs, she had two chickens also.
        - Councilmember Buehler asked from that call you found the chickens.
          - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr stated yes.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked are there people who want to talk.
  - Mayor Mike Smith asked is there anybody who wants to address this one. I don't think that is one they are here for.
- Councilmember Garvey asked they are chickens, not roosters right.
  - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr responded exactly.

The motion was unanimously approved.

## Request for Special Use Permit – More Than 4 Animals – 315 Fawn Valley Court:

Councilmember Studnicka moved to deny the special use permit for 315 Fawn Valley Court. Councilmember Kirby seconded the motion.

- Councilmember Pawlowski asked does anybody out there want to talk.
  - Mayor Smith stated yes ma'am, come on up. Introduce yourself
    - Patricia Cellier replied I have a short outline, so I'll be quickly as possible. I'm Patricia Cellier and I live at 315 Fawn Valley Court. I want to give a guick briefing on the situation for reconsideration. History, a neighbor passed away on Fawn Valley Court who had a lot of animals that he fed and we began a problem with ferals in the neighborhood. And at our expense, in the neighborhood and myself, we started taking care of the situation. We went with, at first, I did my own expense on the animals then I went with Safe Harbor with spay, neuter, exams and shots. And then to Petsmart over the weekend to adopt the animals out and also Perfect Pets for adoption, individuals for adoption and we resolved the situation. And it did take a lot of time and expense, we made donations to those that helped us adopt. In 2017, there was another feral population, so I spoke with Don Brown with Paws at the Country Store regarding the spaying. neutering and shots and he said they need to be 4-6 months so we cared for those animals. In November of '17, we spayed, neutered and did the shots at Hope Vet Clinic. In August of '18, the shots at Hope Clinic. In July '19, exams and shots at the Humane Society of Greater Kansas City at our expense. Don Brown suggested at that time when I spayed and neutered the animals that I call Wendy because she was in Lansing Animal Control and setting up colonies. I'm a firm believer, an ASPCA member, so I believe in catch and release and I believe in spay and neutering and colonies. So, I contacted the ASPCA to find out what are our guidelines for managing or caregiving on colonies. We need a co-manager and caregiver also which we have. I talked to Wendy and she explained to me the colonies, how they were being set up and the neighbors and informed me of other colonies in my area. As a member, I told you I contacted them, all of the guidelines with the ASPCA and colonies were met and were way above and beyond. We do have a co-manager as stated and I have some information on colonies here. It's a good idea, it's a really good idea and it would make her job a lot easier also and the neighborhoods. The problems with cats we resolved now that they are all spayed and neutered, we have neighbors that also say that now we don't have cat fights keeping them awake at night. A lot of the neighbors talk about how they enjoy the cats. We have provided everything for them - food, shelter, you know, everything that they need and we also monitor these animals. I write and I am retired so I went from my office to my kitchen table that overlooks the backyard. Our situation is we have a hill behind with rocks and then straight above. So, I do monitor their health and I monitor everything about them. The neighbors also enjoy them. We had a complaint and Wendy came back to my house and discussed it with me. There was a neighbor that lives behind up on the hill on Forest Glen, there is a hill, rocks and trees and she complained there was excrement on the concrete at her residence believed to be a cat. Later found out when the cat came back, she spoke to her husband and said that cat is back. He took a look and recognized it was racoon. Cats generally do not go on concrete. They can't cover it. But it was indeed a racoon. We have racoons, possums, we've had a couple red fox, deer, you know the usual. We take care of those things. I met with Wendy and the gentleman there on March 15, 2019. Wendy told me there are no longer colonies yet she did mention the colony down the street from me. The co-colony and I offered to resolve the complaint by purchasing two ultrasonic repellers for the front and the back of the resident's home and that would ward off the animals, any animals that are coming into the yard. On Forest Glen, we know that there are other cats in that area. A lot of the neighbors do have cats and they'll let them out during the day or some of them at night. It's hard to

identify the cats. I was informed, Wendy did inform me that to have more than four animals, we need a permit, we need licensing and vaccinations. So, I submitted an application June 10, 2019, submitted spay, neutering exams. vaccinations all with the application. Wendy completed her inspection and the cats have been registered with the City of Lansing and we're trying to comply. And this is where I wanted to make a plea for them to remain in their environment that they're use to. They're a family. That's the environment they're use to. They definitely would not make barn cats and they have everything provided like I said food, shelter, care, monitoring. As noted, if the cats are removed as happened before there will be more cats. So, actually we're doing a service to the City of Lansing by caring for these animals. There have been animals that have gotten loose and we get the phone call and we have the animal back to the person before they even need to report it missing because we are into taking care of these animals and knowing what goes on in our area and environment. Let's see, I was just going to say it was an advantage to the City of Lansing actually.

- Councilmember Buehler asked so ma'am, may I, just to clarify, there was a feral cat colony that you started feeding, you took them all in, had them spayed and neutered. I know and the Police Chief and I have had multiple conversations in the past about how if you take a cat out another cat will come in. So now you have this colony, they are all spayed and neutered, they are all living there and you don't bring them into your house.
  - Patricia Cellier responded no.
    - Councilmember Buehler asked so they just sit outside and you feed basically.
      - Patricia Cellier replied well we built condominiums. She can tell you that with the straw in the winter and so forth and so on. And like I said, they're family, they take care of things. If a new cat comes into the area, we're very well aware of it and there are a few but they come from over on the area and down the street. Don't seem to be a problem.
        - Councilmember Buehler asked so now the feral cat colony is no longer a feral cat colony because it's spayed and neutered and we're not worried about the population booming.
          - Patricia Cellier responded well with catch and release, you catch, spay and neuter. release according to ASPCA. According to them they should be put back into the environment where they came from.
        - Councilmember Buehler stated and I understand that because if they don't. another cat will come in and take their place.
      - Patricia Cellier replied yes.
    - Councilmember Buehler responded ok I get that.
  - Patricia Cellier stated so things are really pretty calm. I don't know how many other complaints there might have been but a lot of neighbors have said how much fun they have, enjoying

these cats. And the complaint was a racoon. If there are complaints, I would like to deal with it.

- Councilmember Buehler asked have there been other complaints.
- Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr stated I would like to comment on Ms. Cellier's narrative of the story. She has her perspective but as the Animal Control Officer these are not a typical colony that we have dealt with.
  - Mayor Smith replied ok let's come on up to the mic.
    - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr stated a colony of cats is going to be feral near the edge of woods, coming up through the woods. We have the past 20+ years haven't enforced licensing cats so we've had lots of people feeding cats and we've had feral cats. The City has them throughout all of the city. I wasn't going after people right away when I first started because that wasn't the first thing on my agenda to try to get done. As I have heard people coming up and taking care of colonies, I've kept them noted and I would eventually get with them and talk with them and see what the situation is. I got a complaint about Ms. Cellier's cats coming up on Forest Glen and lounging all over the back yard, defecating and everything. Mainly at the house directly behind her up the hill. I went down and spoke with Ms. Cellier and thanked her for taking care of them out of her own pocket. Hope Clinic does help out and does free spay and neutering in Leavenworth.
      - Patricia Cellier replied it's not free.
        - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr responded it is free. It's free to Leavenworth County residents.
          - Mayor Smith stated Ms. Cellier, let her finish.
            - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr stated the information she got from Don Brown was his perspective of it but he doesn't know about colonies. He was just giving some advice. I was under the assumption when I first met Ms. Cellier, she was taking care of a colony but then come to find out that she took in two feral mommas who had kittens, raised them. They're, basically, raised as outdoor cats. I've been told she rings a bell and they'll all come to eat. They go about their business throughout the neighborhood. That is not your true colony. A colony is still going to be wild. I call them racoons in cat suits. They don't want you to touch them. That is why you trap to spay and neuter and then put them back. If you take them out of that area, yes, it will flood in with those that are from other colonies getting booted out. These are basically cats that are living within her backyard and that are part of the neighborhood. And that's why I believe with all good intentions Ms. Cellier's in denial, not comprehending that these are basically barn cats. They might not be the most friendly, they're not in her house but they've been raised to live outside and come to eat. She is supporting their food. They're not allowed, it's one thing to support them in the winter
              - Patricia Cellier responded they hunt. Excuse me, they also do hunt.
                - Mayor Smith stated hold on. give her a chance.

- Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr stated that is extra but to constantly feed them. They are going to be sunning on the neighbor's porches.
- Councilmember Pawlowski stated this is similar to the situation we had down on Cottonwood a few years ago.
- Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr stated you know it's. if I get areas where there's complaints and somebody is feeding I'm going to address those and this is the first one I've gotten the complaint and then realizing the whole situation. That's why I gave her the ultimatum to either apply for a permit, it would be up to the board or get rid of all or just have four and find homes for the other ones.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked does she have cats in the house too.
- Patricia Cellier replied no.
- Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr responded no.
- Councilmember Pawlowski replied just the ones outside.
- Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr stated yes.
  - Councilmember Pawlowski asked there are eight outside.
    - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr replied nine. You know, I understand you get in a relationship with the cats but you also have to take into consideration your neighbors. And if they don't have cats or animals they shouldn't have to put up with your cats and your enjoyment encroaching on their property.
      - Patricia Cellier responded with other neighbors enjoying them and caring for them also.
        - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr responded same thing, it's City Ordinances and that is what I am enforcing.
          - Mayor Smith asked is there anybody in the audience that wanted to address this.
            - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr replied ves. I know Ms. Henry is here also.
- Lela Henry stated thank you for the opportunity to address the board. Thank you to the Mayor for that hearty welcome that you gave me. I wasn't prepared really to give a speech, an opposition speech but I find it may be necessary for me to do so. I've learned a lot listening to what you do and we thank you for your service.
  - o Patricia Cellier stated I just wanted to make one other comment. We did offer to resolve the situation.
    - Mayor Smith replied listen, let her finish. Go ahead and have a seat.
      - Lela Henry stated I have been in contact with Wendy and I appreciate the fact that Wendy did listen to my concerns about the cats at large in the neighborhood who have become a nuisance in my neighborhood. I am going to read what I was going to submit. Ok. 'It is my understanding that the purpose of Ms. Celliers request is to allow her to keep four animals that she currently owns plus an additional five. It is my assumption that she understands that she must comply with the mandates of the Lansing Kansas Code of Ordinances, Chapter 2 Animal Control Regulation if the permit is granted. Thus preventing these animals from trespassing on the properties of others and constituting a nuisance in the neighborhood. I am asking the City of Lansing to deny her request as she is currently in violation of Code of Ordinance Chapter 2 Animal Control and Regulation with the additional five animals that are currently in her care. Now there have been a lot of

cats running around my neighborhood and they pretty much spend as much time up the hill as they do down the hill which creates a problem for me. The first time I had to make a complaint about the cats is when one of the cats had I guess four or five kittens, ok. They resided up in my area for most of the time. So that tells me someone in the community is not taking care of the cats. And my concern is, there are codes that say what you must do. You must follow the code. You can't have cats running at large around the neighborhood. I have had to clean cat poop, I have had to, they're cats started living and staying for hours and hours at my front door and around my property. This has been going on for over 18 months. So, my concern here, she sounds like she has a good plan for the cats she is taking care of, but my concern is she must follow the Code. And the Code is very specific on what she must adhere to and those Codes have been violated. And I have made Wendy very much aware of my concern but even to this day. Now, I have my typed statement to submit and I have pictures. I take pictures almost every day to show these cats are on my property a great deal of the time. And that is not fair to me. I am not able to chase cats out of my property nor is my husband so my health is at stake. And I am concerned about the sanitation conditions around my property being around all the properties when you have nine cats that are running loose. So that gives you the basis of my objection. She is not in compliance with following Section 2 of the Ordinance and it is very specific. Can I present?

- Mayor Smith asked anybody else in the audience want to address this. One more time, come on Up.
  - Patricia Cellier replied there are numerous cats on Forest Glen that she is talking about. They come down in our area also. We don't know which cats they are but whatever. We're trying to comply with all the rules and regulations, that's why we're doing the permit. There were neighbors that wanted to adopt these cats. That would put them back in the same environment. Everybody was going to adopt different cats so they stay there and that puts them right back in the same neighborhood as we're talking about. And what happens if these cats are taken away, more cats as said. And we really are, I thought the best thing to do would be to not adopt them all out. To go ahead and just do a permit and then follow all the Codes the best we can.
- Mayor Smith stated we appreciate everybody coming, making comments because the rules say you come before the governing body, they make a decision and that is what we are here for to do. Is anybody on the Council have any questions. Yes, sir. Come on up please.
  - Bob Condit stated I live at 514 Forest Glen. I am a neighbor to Lela, I live directly above Patricia. There have always been at least five, six, eight feral cats since I moved there in 2002, over the Christmas break of 2001, into 2002. There has always been the issue of defecation around houses where there is loose dirt. Cats get removed, more come in. The litter she is talking about was born in an abandoned vehicle at 510 Forest Glen. And it was when Patricia trapped them and brought them down, that the mother was spayed and those kittens were taken care of and we would watch them play in the back yard which was actually under the power lines. So, there is a right of way of the power lines that come out either side. And that is where those were and the others I'm not aware of. But this initially started when Lela complained to me about a cat defecating on her front porch on the concrete and I tried to tell her cats don't do that on concrete. They'll go on grass or dirt and we finally saw the coons coming in quite a bit. But others have asked to take care of the cats or adopt and license them themselves. They'll say no because initially Patricia believed she was applying for a colony, following those guidelines and was paying for all of that. So, I noticed you were quick to approve the initial one for more than four and quick to start disapproving for hers although I'm sure it's different circumstances. But if you deny her, is the City going to reimburse her for expenses in trying to get this in what she thought was following the right way because she spent a lot

of money having cats spayed, shots, neutered and all that and now you're taking this away. So that is my question to you on that.

- Councilmember McNeill responded well I'll start answering it off the get go. I kind of go by when it's brought up, what the situation is, was there a complaint. do other neighbors coming in and actually complain to the Council. Typically, if there is complaints, I deny it and I do that on behalf of the neighbors who came in and said you need to do something about it and either or not that person was following the Code. Now animals at large, I've had people come in and say that they want another two dogs, alright. These dogs aren't jumping the fences and running around the neighborhood and pooping on lawns, ok. Those are typically in the yard so cats just at large, I mean, and having them try to apply for a permit to keep more than you're allowed by Code. I mean that's my perspective. representing the city.
  - Bob Condit replied I have also seen cats, I mean dogs jump the fences. I have returned a couple and have gone in yards. I don't complain about it. I just try to get them back to the right person and then do it.
    - Councilmember McNeill responded typically not a pack of nine.
      - Bob Condit replied we've had that problem too. Where a person had an escape artist, constantly coming over to our area and that was like four houses down. Yes. ma'am.
        - Councilmember Pawlowski stated so we've had this issue come up before. There was a woman in my neighborhood that was feeding cats and the neighbors were, it was very similar, she was feeding cats out on her porch, she also had cats inside her house. That is why I asked if she had them inside too; and the issue, I have with cats, I love cats, but I've been a cat person my whole life. The problem is when it starts affecting your neighbors and the City Code, I believe, says there is supposed to be leashed. Well I've never leashed one of my cats, but they don't go outside anymore. I think that is the difference, is that you can keep dogs corralled, you can't keep cats corralled.
          - Bob Condit asked on the neighbor that was feeding the cats that you had an issue with, did she pay to have them spayed and neutered.
            - Councilmember Pawlowski responded she did actually and she was denied the ability to keep them because there were so many people that were complaining.
          - Bob Condit asked have you had other than one complaint on these cats.
        - Councilmember Pawlowski replied I don't know.
      - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr responded it's just been the one complaint. But it's not the issue of the complaint. First, addressing the issue of the amount of cats in the one concentrated area that one person is taking care of and still allowing them, not doing anything to stop them from roaming the area. This isn't on the edge of the woods where she is going out and

feeding feral cats in the wintertime, making sure they have food. This is in the middle of the neighborhood.

- Councilmember Garvey asked she can have three cats and still not allow them to run at large, right.
- Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr replied right. Oh, absolutely.
- Councilmember McNeill stated she can have them all and not run them at large.
- Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr stated she could have nine cats and they could never leave the yard. There are things you can get for the fences, there's building a cattery.
- Councilmember Garvey stated but three cats you wouldn't have to address that. You wouldn't have to come here for a variance.
  - o Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr responded right.
    - Councilmember Garvey stated at the end of the limit of four, she still can't let them run at large.
      - Councilmember Pawlowski stated but if she had three cats that were bothering neighbors, we'd still have the same policy.
        - Councilmember Garvey responded that's what I mean, the running at large thing.
- Mayor Smith asked Gene did you have a question.
  - Councilmember Kirby stated I got one.
    - Bob Condit stated because you can also bring up the issue, there were multiple cats that have homes that roam the neighborhood.
      - Councilmember Pawlowski responded and that is also a problem.
        - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr replied and when I have people that complain and they know who's cat it is, like I said we haven't enforced cat licensing for over 20 years. I can't correct it in two.
          - Mayor Smith stated we gotcha. Gene what's your question.
            - Bob Condit replied oh. I understand that.
              - o Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr responded I do my best. That's the one thing I don't know if people have cats. I can tell pretty much if they have a dog, knock on the door. That tells me it all, but cats are different. And people don't like to say that they have cats.
                - Mayor Smith stated we're good.
              - Councilmember Kirby stated the other thing I think we're missing, and I don't know who has the allergy but I'm allergic to cats. Not fun.
            - Bob Condit replied oh, I understand that. I totally understand that.
          - Councilmember Kirby stated well I mean; we're going on about cats but here is a lady that has a medical condition that I think it's getting lost in the whole thing. So that's it. Thank you.
        - Mayor Smith stated yes, ma'am.
      - Lela Henry stated I just need to quickly correct something. I never had a conversation with Bob regarding the cat pooping on the sidewalk. In fact, a week or so ago he was over on my property, Mr. Bob, and there was cat poop and I was talking to my lawn repair and Bob went to get something to remove the poop. I asked him to not remove it. I need that

as evidence to show this is happening. I told him the cat was pooping in my front door area and I'm going to step in it one day. My husband too. He's not here but he's on my side as far as we're just not able to take care of all these cats. We have enough proof and pictures of these cats running at large in my neighborhood. Thank you.

- Mayor Smith stated we've kind of beat this to death. If there is nothing new on this side, I think we got a motion to deny unless the Council wants to pull that.
- o Councilmember Pawlowski asked Don.
- Councilmember Studnicka responded I still move to deny.
  - Councilmember Kirby replied I still second.
    - Patricia Cellier asked do I get that in writing, sir
      - Mayor Smith replied it'll be in the minutes.

The motion was unanimously approved.

Ordinance No. 1025 - Standard Traffic Ordinance Adoption: Councilmember Kirby moved to approve Ordinance No. 1025, adopting the 2019 Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities, 47th Edition. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Ordinance No. 1026 - Uniform Public Offense Code Adoption: Councilmember Buehler moved to approve Ordinance No. 1026, adopting the 2019 Uniform Public Offense Code for Kansas Cities, 35th Edition. Councilmember Kirby seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Ordinance No. 1027 – Fine, Bond, Court Fees & Costs Established by Municipal Court Judge: Councilmember Kirby moved to approve Ordinance No. 1027, adopting the City of Lansing Municipal Court Fines & Fees Schedule. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Ordinance No. 1028 – Vacation of Utility and Drainage Easement – 712 First Terrace: Councilmember Buehler moved to approve Ordinance No. 1028, as presented. Councilmember Kirby seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Mayor Smith stated folks a lot of you out there, these are things that have been discussed in past meetings or work sessions and they're just going through the motion now.

Ordinance No. 1029 – Vacation of Drainage and Sanitary Sewer Easement 00000 N. Main Street: Councilmember Kirby moved to approve Ordinance No. 1029 and authorize the Mayor to execute the new storm drainage and sanitary sewer easements and quit claim deed. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Homestead Acres Perimeter Street Fees: Councilmember Trinkle moved to approve the request to waive Perimeter Street Fees for Homestead Acres. Councilmember McNeill seconded the motion.

- Mayor Smith stated Matt.
  - Councilmember McNeill asked so I mean I had a question on the CIP and whether or not we ever repaired this road at all.
    - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz asked you had a question on what, the CIP.
      - Councilmember McNeill responded yeah, is this on any priority, do we repair the road, do we pave the road, do we do anything to that road.
        - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz replied it's not on any CIP plan that I am aware of. I think the only thing we have ever done to it in terms of maintaining it is maybe a chip seal or an overlay on it.

- City Administrator Tim Vandall stated I think we looked back and I think we've done an asphalt overlay at some point in the last 10 years but it's not on our 2050 plan. So, it's not on pace to have a major renovation for guite awhile.
  - Councilmember McNeill replied ok.
- Mayor Smith asked questions. Andi.
  - Councilmember Pawlowski asked is there something we can do less than the hundred whatever it was thousand dollars.
    - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz responded the governing body can set the fee at whatever they want to set it at, I think. I mean you could waive a portion of it.
      - City Attorney Greg Robinson replied you could waive any portion you want.
        - Councilmember Kirby asked there was a question on whether somebody else previously had to pay it and the answer was they did.
          - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz responded yes.
            - Councilmember Buehler stated it was Wayne Domann down there.
              - City Administrator Tim Vandall stated so I think if you guys remember that was part of a larger subdivision that was 30 something lots.
                - Community & Economic **Development Director Matthew** Schmitz responded the homes that front DeSoto that are on the north side of Holiday and South side of Holiday, there's, I think, 4 on the North and 4 on the South that were part of Maple Hills 4th plat if memory serves. Those were done with a 37-lot subdivision that did pay perimeter street fees because they were also doing Holiday Lane and the other streets that were over in that subdivision. So those fees, again if memory serves, I believe around \$45,000 was spread over 37 lots.
- Councilmember Buehler replied so it's not on any CIP, so it's not on the chip and seal plan anytime in the future.
  - City Administrator Tim Vandall stated it would be on the list for mill and overlay at some point.
    - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz replied we would continue to maintain it, absolutely.
      - Councilmember Garvey asked but it would be on the list regardless if they built houses or not though, right.
        - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied what's that.
          - Councilmember Garvey asked it would probably be on list regardless if they built houses or not.
            - City Administrator Tim Vandall responded yeah.
              - Councilmember Garvey stated regardless whether they build them.

- City Administrator Tim Vandall stated correct, but I mean I understood the earlier question as are we making plans to build it as a collector street at some point and we're not. We're not planning on installing sidewalks or turn lanes or anything like that.
- Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz responded the street is identified as a collector, if I may, the street is identified as a collector level street because that is the overall transportation plan for ultimate build out of that area. Who knows when that is going to occur.
- Councilmember Pawlowski stated so Tim and I had a discussion about this. I have several issues with this plat, but there's nothing we can do about that now. So, on a normal house that is going into a subdivision that did or didn't have perimeter street fees, they'd still have sewer hook up so there would be charges for that. There'd be sidewalks and that kind of thing put in. So, this subdivision went in and basically, they're paying to plat it but there are no other expenses to them because the road is already blacktopped and no sidewalks and there is no sewer. So, being that we will generate as far as income from this lot will be our share of the property taxes. And the permit to do the inspections. So my thought was this is probably not the only time this is going to come up so maybe what we should be doing is have a development fee of some sort in lieu of because except for a couple of instances in the past, we waive this fee as much as we don't waive it. I mean probably 50/50. So maybe what we need to do is rethink this and do a development fee for lots that aren't on improved streets.
  - Councilmember Buehler replied that sounds like a work session.
    - City Administrator Tim Vandall responded, actually we do have this penciled in on the August work session to discuss more thoroughly.
      - Mayor Smith asked ok, we got a motion to second. Do you want to table it, withdraw it, table it another time.
        - Councilmember Pawlowski replied well nobody said anything.
          - Councilmember McNeill stated the issue I got Andi to what you just said was they do include all that but they get sewer, they get a sidewalk, they get their street maintained in those kind of areas so I agree if we go to some other format where its just a house being developed on an improved road or something that we charge x fee for whatever. In my view, this is three houses on a road that we chip and seal. We got to chip and seal it anyway, we got a whole other housing area over there.
            - Councilmember Pawlowski responded I don't think we chip and sealed that road. I think we overlaid it.
              - Councilmember McNeill replied or overlay it.
                - Councilmember Pawlowski stated but we sit up here all the time and try to figure out where we're going to get money for stuff.
              - Councilmember Kirby responded and here we are letting it go.
            - Councilmember Pawlowski replied yeah and we have some people, you know, I don't know how to explain it.

- Councilmember McNeill stated we did discuss last time but even if you charge x percent and I don't care if its, if you take 37 into \$44,000 that we charged a whole development that's what a \$1200 per house. So, if you want to charge them \$1200 a lot then I'm ok with that but you know, you got to compare it. It doesn't compare. And to say \$3000 is going to do anything other than a chip and seal so I mean if we're going to be fair then we can do that. But I mean I don't see a \$100,000, I mean that is ridiculous.
- Councilmember Pawlowski responded well no I'm not saying we should do the \$100,000 but I'm saying should, is it an all or nothing or should there be something in between.
- Councilmember Buehler replied so propose something then.
- Councilmember Pawlowski stated I don't have. I mean.
- City Administrator Tim Vandall stated I think there is a motion on the floor.
- Councilmember Studnicka replied we got a motion to approve.
  - City Administrator Tim Vandall asked approve the denial.
    - City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner stated approve to waive.
      - City Administrator Tim Vandall responded for the waive.
        - City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner stated the waiving of the perimeter street fees.
          - Councilmember Buehler asked so the motion is to approve the waiving of the perimeter street fees. Ok.
            - Mayor Smith replied right.
              - Councilmember Studnicka responded correct.
- Mayor Smith stated well let's see where we're at with this.
  - Councilmember Garvey asked so they can make a motion to approve it based on a different number though right.
    - Councilmember Buehler replied if we pull this.
      - City Administrator Tim Vandall responded after we set the motion.
        - Councilmember Pawlowski stated or we could put it on a study session. We all love study sessions.
          - Councilmember Buehler replied we delayed it once.
            - Councilmember Garvey responded we already postponed it for a month.
              - Councilmember Trinkle stated I'm sure these people would like to get started on something.
                - Councilmember Pawlowski asked what if we, they said they have a \$300 park fee.
              - Councilmember Buehler replied \$400.
            - City Administrator Tim Vandall responded I think it's \$400.
          - Councilmember Pawlowski asked \$400 park fee.
        - Councilmember Kirby stated it needs to be, whatever it is. I don't want to start pulling money out of there calling it something.
      - Councilmember Pawlowski replied what about \$1500.
    - Councilmember Kirby responded and that is for August. I don't want to start it, don't grab the numbers out here and we won't call it this, we'll call it that.
  - Councilmember Buehler stated that's what we need a work session for.
- Councilmember Trinkle stated I think we let it go and sit down and discuss it.
  - Councilmember Buehler asked so we got a motion.

- Mayor Smith replied we got a motion and a second.
  - Councilmember McNeill stated I mean that basically is two options, right. We can either pass it and waive it or if you are strong over on charging some fee; you know, like I said, if you're going to be fair then we kind of have to do what we did to that development at DeSoto. That would be about \$1200 a lot. If you want to go that way, we got to take back our motions Dave.
    - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz responded I don't want to complicate things more but that development on DeSoto, the lot sizes were 3/10's of an acre for \$1200. These are 2 1/2 acres.
      - Councilmember McNeill replied gotcha.
        - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz responded a little bit of discrepancy there.
          - City Attorney Greg Robinson stated it seems like you need to come up with a formula because you are never going to have apples to apples when you get this infill stuff. So, at some point right now it's just a very blatant number of percentage or linear feet that doesn't always work out with 2 ½ acres vs .37. Maybe you have to come up with a like stagger them, if somebody has 20 acres, we can get three houses per acre on that but then if they come in and only put 10 instead of 30 well then you can adjust that fee for that if that is what is prudent for that particular development.
            - Community & Economic **Development Director Matthew** Schmitz replied and that is part of the bigger discussion that we need to have during a work session.
          - City Attorney Greg Robinson responded oh sure. Absolutely.
        - Councilmember McNeill asked when is the next.
      - Mayor Smith stated we can get this vote and then if it doesn't pan out, and we want to address it again, we can but we're going to drag this on all night.
    - Councilmember Buehler responded we're going to talk about this next week.
  - Councilmember McNeill replied I'm here.
- Mayor Smith responded no we're three weeks out.
- Councilmember Buehler stated sorry week after next. You're right.
- Councilmember Trinkle stated I say waive it and then we need to sit down as a Council, just like we have in other situations.
  - Councilmember McNeill stated we need a motion.
    - Councilmember Buehler replied that is what the motion is. Let's vote.
      - Mayor Smith stated let's call the roll on this.

The motion was approved with Councilmember Studnicka and Councilmember Pawlowski voting against the motion.

- Mayor Smith stated alright, thank god. It passes and we'll set up a Work Session on that. Thank you.
  - Pawlowski responded Gene, you'll want money for something and you just gave it away.
    - Mayor Smith stated take care folks.

Award of Bid - Eisenhower Sewer Extension Project (City Project 19-03): Councilmember McNeill moved to approve the bid of Westland Construction for the installation of City Project 19-03, in the amount of \$188,300.00. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion.

- Councilmember Pawlowski asked have we worked with this company before.
  - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell responded I personally have not. I have other professionals in the industry that have. And we called all their references this week and spoke with them.
    - Councilmember Pawlowksi stated they aren't like anybody else we.
      - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied no they're very, they came highly recommended. Everybody that worked with them would work with them again.
        - o Mayor Smith stated I know where you're going Andi.
          - Councilmember Pawlowski responded thank you very much Tony.

The motion was unanimously approved.

- Councilmember Kirby this will teach you to ask to be at the first of the meeting and not the last of the meeting.
  - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell I was a little late getting my agenda item in, so this is my penance. Thank you.
    - Mayor Smith thank you Tony. Smart move.

**Department Heads:** Department Heads had nothing to report.

City Attorney: City Attorney had nothing to report.

City Engineer: City Engineer Matt Harding had nothing to report.

City Administrator: City Administrator Tim Vandall introduced the new Public Works Director, Mike Spickelmier. Public Works Director Mike Spickelmier stated there are a lot of great things going on and thanked everyone for the support he has gotten. The Council welcomed him to the City.

Governing Body: Councilmember McNeill addressed the issue of residents applying for More than Four Animals Permit and enduring the expenses of licensing, shots, etc and then being denied the permit. He suggested if the permit is approved then they are given a specific amount of time to get everything done so they aren't out the expenses if the permit is denied.

- Mayor Smith asked what the time limit is once the permit is denied before action is taken.
  - Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr stated there isn't a specified time, but a reasonable amount of time is given for the re-homing.

Councilmember Studnicka stated that he spoke with Wendy last year and was informed that feral cats were caught, spayed/neutered at the City's expense and then released back into the wild. He feels there are too many feral cats around.

- Animal Control Officer Wendy Burr responded it is hard to correct a 20-year problem with feral cats.
  - Councilmember Studnicka stated he appreciates her doing her job and wants her to keep doing her job. The problem is with State regulations on some animals like beavers but overall feral cats in the city have been doing damage to flower beds in his neighborhood for vears.

Councilmember Trinkle stated there are residents who don't follow the City regulations and once they are caught, they ask for forgiveness and that doesn't always work.

Councilmember Kirby stated he participated in handing out football gear and uniforms with Parks & Rec and they do a really good job with organizing that.



SUBJECT: Structure Removal Cost Share Application – 111 North Main Street - Main Structure

Removal of unsafe and dilapidated structures in Lansing is a part of the process to maintain the vitality of Lansing's business district and residential neighborhoods. The city of Lansing is participating in a property owner cost share program of eligible structures for 50% of qualified expenses up to \$4,000 per structure.

For property owners to qualify, they must meet certain guidelines outlined in the Structure Removal Cost Share Policy set by the city of Lansing. A copy of the policy is attached.

The property at 111 North Main Street was put on notice about conditions of the structure and an inspection was requested by the City Inspector over a year ago. The family has been involved in court proceedings to be able to take conservatorship and obtain judgement to get the structure removed. Attached are two bids submitted from two local contractors.

Structure removal must be completed within 90 days of the approved application to remain eligible for the reimbursement.

Policy Consideration: Payment to the contractor would be released within thirty (30) days once the city has received written proof that the owner has paid the contractor the remaining portion of the bid and the site has been cleared with a final inspection by the City Inspector.

Financial Consideration: The bid for the main structure and removal of transite siding is \$8,900.00. The financial consideration to the City Council is 50% of a qualified bid up to \$4000.00, so the portion due the contractor from the city cost share program would be \$4000.00, if approved.

Action: Staff recommends a motion to approve the structure removal cost share application with the bid from Britz Wrecking for the main structure located at 111 North Main Street, Lansing, Kansas.

Policy

## Purpose: Structure Removal Cost Share Policy

Removal of unsafe and dilapidated structures in Lansing is a part of the process to maintain the vitality of Lansing' business district and residential neighborhoods. The city of Lansing is participating in a property owner cost share program of eligible structures for 50% of qualified expenses up to \$4,000.00 per structure. The cost share program will end on December 31, 2017, unless extended by the City Council.

For property owners to qualify for reimbursement, the following conditions must be met:

- Previously identified by the city of Lansing. Structures must have been previously identified by city staff as unsafe and dilapidated and a property owner notified in writing in order for the structural removal costs to be reimbursed to the property owner; and
- 2. <u>Owner completed application</u>. An application for reimbursement must be completed by the authorized agent for the property owner or the property owner to include:
- a. Application for reimbursement under the cost share program. Application must indicate if payment from the city should be made to the owner or the contractor after completion of the project; and
- b. a completed demolition permit application (fee will be waived) from the Lansing Building Inspector; and
- c. Two (2) written estimates from contractors for qualifying demolition expenses including: 1) demolition permit; 2) the costs of demolition: foundations, wood framing, brick or block walls, asphalt or metal roofing, dry wall, insulation, plumbing, electrical or mechanical equipment; 3) costs of environmental mitigation (e.g. asbestos or lead abatement); 4) costs of capping sewer; and 5) costs of earth fill, re-grading and seeding of the site.

## 3. Application and amount approved by City Council.

- a. Community & Economic Development staff will review the application and make a recommendation to the City Council. The application will be placed on the next available Council agenda for consideration.
- b. Following the City Council's decision, the property owner shall receive written approval of eligible structure and amount of qualifying expenses to be reimbursed from the city of Lansing.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 1030**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS AMENDING UNDER CHAPTER 2, ARTICLE 5 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS, AND AMENDMENTS THERETO.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS:

**SECTION 1.** Chapter 2, Article 5 of the code of the City of Lansing is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### ARTICLE V. - PERMITS AND LICENSING

#### Sec. 2-501 Permit for More Than Four Animals

Any person or organization wishing to own, keep or harbor more than four (4) dogs, cats or other non-prohibited animals or combination of non-prohibited animals at the same address or on the same premises shall be required to obtain a City permit for said ownership.

- A. An application for any permit required pursuant to this section shall be made to the Chief of Police in writing and upon a form furnished by the Chief of Police. Said application shall be verified by the person who desires to have, keep, maintain or have in his/her possession or under his/her control, in the City, the animals for which a permit is required, and shall set forth the following:
  - 1. Name, address and telephone number of the applicant.
  - 2. The applicant's interest in such animals and justification why such number of animals should be allowed in the City.
  - 3. The proposed location, and the name, address, and telephone number of the owner of such location, and of the lessee, if any.
  - 4. The number and general description of all animals for which the permit is sought.
  - 5. Any information known to the applicant concerning vicious or dangerous propensities of all such animals.
  - 6. The housing arrangements for all such animals with particular details as to safety or structure, locks, fencing, etc.
  - 7. Safety precautions proposed to be taken.
  - 8. Noises or odors anticipated in the keeping of such animals.
  - 9. Prior history of incidents involving the public health or safety involving any of

said animals.

- 10. Proof of insurance to cover those who may be injured or killed by said animal.
- 11. A statement, signed by the applicant, indemnifying the City and its agents and employees for any and all injuries that may result from said animal.
- 12. Any additional information required by the Chief of Police or his/her designated representative at the time of filing such application or thereafter.

In addition, the applicant shall allow the Chief of Police or his/her designated representative the ability to inspect the animals and/or property where the animals are to be kept.

- B. The fee for a permit application shall be \$25.00 per permit. The fee is nonrefundable. Said fee shall be payable to the Chief of Police at the time of filing the permit application.
- C. Upon the submission of a fully and properly completed application for permit fees, but not later than forty-five (45) days after submission, the Chief of Police or his/her designated representative shall begin an investigation to determine whether or not the permit should be issued.
- D. No permit shall be granted except upon the explicit finding by the Chief of Police that the issuance of a permit will not be contrary to the public health, safety and general welfare. The Chief of Police may consider, but is not limited to the following factors in making its determination: the possible impact on neighbors and the surrounding area; the possibility of harm to the general public; detriment to the health of the animal(s) or neighboring animals; public nuisance, sanitary or offensive conditions; the noises from the animals and possible odors; the number of animals; planning and zoning requirements; etc. The Chief of Police may attach requirements and conditions to the issuance of the permit which the applicant will be required to comply with.

#### Sec. 2-502 Permits; Other

Any permit which is required under the provision of this chapter, except for the permits specified in Section 2-501 and Section 2-601, shall be subject to the following provisions:

- A. An application for such permit shall be made to the Chief of Police in writing and upon a form furnished by the Chief of Police. Said application shall be verified by the person who desired to have, keep, maintain or have in his/her possession or under his/her control, in the City, the animal for which a permit is required, and shall set forth the following:
  - 1. Name, address and telephone number of the applicant.
  - 2. The applicant's interest in such animals and justification why such prohibited

animal should be allowed in the City.

- 3. The proposed location, and the name, address, and telephone number of the owner of such location, and of the lessee, if any.
- 4. The number and general description of all animals for which the permit is sought.
- 5. Any information known to the applicant concerning vicious or dangerous propensities of such animals.
- 6. The housing arrangements for all such animals with particular details as to safety or structure, locks, fencing, etc.
- Safety precautions proposed to be taken.
- 8. Noised or odors anticipated in the keeping of such animals.
- 9. Prior history of incidents involving the public health or safety involving any of said animals.
- 10. Proof of insurance to cover those who may be injured or killed by said animal.
- 11. A statement, signed by the applicant, indemnifying the City and its agents and employees for any and all injuries that may result from said animal.
- 12. Any additional information required by the Chief of Police or his/her designated representative at the time of filing such application or thereafter.

In addition, the applicant shall allow the Chief of Police or his/her designated representative the ability to inspect the animal and/or property where the animal are to be kept.

- B. The fee for a permit application shall be \$25.00 per permit. The fee is nonrefundable. Said fee shall be payable to the Chief of Police at the time of filing the permit application.
- C. Upon the submission of a fully and properly completed application for permit fees, but not later than forty-five (45) days after submission, the Chief of Police or his/her designated representative shall begin an investigation to determine whether or not the permit should be issued.
- D. No permit shall be granted except upon the explicit finding by the Chief of Police that the issuance of a permit will not be contrary to the public health, safety and general welfare. The Chief of Police may consider, but is not limited to the following factors in making its determination: the possible impact on neighbors and the surrounding area; the possibility of harm to the general public; detriment to the health of the animal(s) or neighboring animals; public nuisance, sanitary or

offensive conditions; the noises from the animals and possible odors; the number of animals; planning and zoning requirements; etc. The Chief of Police may attach requirements and conditions to the issuance of the permit which the applicant will be required to comply with.

#### Sec. 2-503 Permit, Term and Renewal

No permit required by this chapter shall be granted for a period in excess of one year. An application for renewal of any permit shall be made not less than forty-five (45) days prior to the expiration thereof and shall be accompanied by a \$25.00 renewal fee.

#### Sec. 2-504 Permit; Inspections, Investigations, and Issuance of Renewal

Prior to the annual renewal of any permit issued hereunder and at least once, not more than six (6) months after the issuance of any such permit or after its renewal, the Chief of Police, animal control officer or a designated representative shall inspect the premises subject to such permit to determine whether the person to whom it has been issued is complying or continuing to comply with all of the conditions specified in this article. In addition, the officer or representative shall investigate the past history of the permit holder to determine whether during the past permit period the permit holder was in compliance with all of the conditions specified in the article. The investigation may include a review of department records and interviews with the permit holder and neighbors. If the officer or representative determines during any such inspection and investigation that any of the conditions therein specified are being violated or have been noted during the past permit period, he/she shall recommend denial of a renewal of any such permit, and/or he/she shall recommend revocation of such permit in the event that such violation is not corrected within such period of time as he/she shall direct. Upon completion of the investigation and review process provided herein, the Chief of Police or his/her designated representative shall either renew or deny the permit.

#### Sec. 2-505 Permit; Revocation and Suspension

The Chief of Police may, for good cause, revoke any permit or modify any terms or provisions thereof and may, in the event it is reasonably necessary to protect against an immediate threat or danger to the public health or safety, suspend any permit or portion thereof without hearing. Failure to comply with any of the provisions of this chapter shall be considered good cause for revocation or suspension of a permit.

#### Sec. 2-506 Appeals; Fee

- A. Any person aggrieved by or dissatisfied with any of the decisions, rulings, actions or finding by the Chief of Police or his/her designated representative in regards to a denial, revocation or suspension of a permit may, within ten (10) days thereafter, file a written notice or statement of appeal from said decision, ruling, action or finding to the Lansing Governing Body.
- B. An administrative fee of \$10.00 shall be paid to the City Clerk and is required for each appeal to the Lansing Governing Body, and no appeal shall be set for hearing until such fee has been paid. No appeal shall be set for hearing if it is filed more than ten (10) days after said action, decision, ruling or findings of the Chief of Police or his/her designated representative from which the party is appealing.

- C. An appeal shall be scheduled for hearing within forty-five (45) days after the request and fees are received by the City Clerk.
- D. The filing of an appeal under this subsection shall not say any action taken pursuant to this chapter.
- E. The decision of the Governing Body to either affirm or reverse the determination previously made by the Chief of Police regarding the issuance of a permit shall be final.

#### Sec. 2-507 Licensing; Vaccination

No person shall own or have custody of any dog or cat over four months of age unless such dog or cat is licensed as herein provided.

- A. Before a license will be issued, the animal owner must produce satisfactory evidence that the dog or cat has been vaccinated against rabies with either of the following:
  - 1. Killed tissue vaccine (also known as "one-year" vaccine) within the twelve (12) months previous to the date of the issuance of the license.
  - 2. Modified live virus vaccine (also known as "three-year" vaccine) within the thirty-six (36) months previous to the date of the issuance of the license.
- B. The one-year license fee shall be \$15.00 for each dog or cat; however, if spayed or neutered the one-year license fee shall be \$7.50 for each dog or cat. The three-year license fee shall be \$45.00 for each dog or cat; however, if spayed or neutered the three-year license fee shall be \$20.00 for each dog or cat.
- C. All licenses shall be valid from the date of issuance through the last day of the month containing either the one-year or three-year anniversary of the date of issuance, depending upon the type of vaccination administered to the animal. The office of the Chief of Police is authorized to issue dog and cat licenses.
- D. Each person shall, upon purchase of the required license, cause such animal to wear a durable tag furnished by the police department for the particular animal for which the license is issued, and bearing the animal's assigned number. In case of the loss of any tag, the police department shall, upon presentation of the original receipt, issue a duplicate tag at no charge. No person shall place upon any animal a Cityissued tag other than the one given for the particular animal for which it is issued.
- E. Failure of an owner or keeper of an animal required to be registered pursuant to this chapter to either:
  - 1. Procure and maintain current rabies vaccination(s) on said animal; and/or
  - 2. Purchase the annual City license for said animal, shall be a municipal offense

and, upon conviction, shall be punishable by a fine of \$90.00, plus applicable court costs.

#### Sec. 2-508 Violations and Penalties

Date Published:

Unless otherwise stated herein, the failure to obtain any permit required pursuant to this article shall be a municipal violation for which a mandatory court appearance shall be required. Upon conviction in the Municipal Court, a defendant shall be fined not les than \$200.00 nor more than \$1,00.00, plus applicable court costs, per offense. In addition to the fine imposed, the Court may sentence the defendant to imprisonment in the county jail for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days. In addition, the Court shall order the registration (if any) of the subject animal revoked and the animal removed from the City. Should the defendant refuse to remove the animal from the City, the Municipal Court Judge shall find the defendant owner in contempt and order the immediate confiscation and impoundment of the animal.

**SECTION 2. AMEND.** This ordinance shall amend Chapter 2, Article 5 of the Lansing City Code.

**SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY.** If any section, clause, sentence, or phrase of this ordinance is found to be unconstitutional or is otherwise held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect the validity of any remaining parts of this ordinance.

**SECTION 4.** This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication in the official City newspaper.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 1031

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS AMENDING UNDER CHAPTER 5, ARTICLE 15 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS, AND AMENDMENTS THERETO.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS:

**SECTION 1.** Chapter 5, Article 15 of the code of the City of Lansing is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### ARTICLE XV. - ARBORIST - TREE TRIMMING - LAWNCARE

#### Sec. 5-1501 License Required

No person shall engage in the business of cutting, trimming, pruning, removing, spraying or otherwise treating trees and/or lawns, within the City without first procuring a license therefor from the City Clerk. The application for such license shall specify the types of service for which the applicant desires to be licensed. Nothing contained in this article shall be construed to prevent the owner or occupant from performing work on his or her own property.

#### Sec. 5-1502 License

Every such license shall show upon its face the types of service in which the licensee therein named is licensed and authorized to render and perform.

#### Sec. 5-1503 Insurance Requirement

No license shall be effective or be issued until the applicant or licensee shall present to the City Clerk a satisfactory public liability insurance policy covering all operations of such applicant or licensee in such business in the City in the sum of at least \$50,000.00 per occurrence bodily injury liability insurance and at least \$50,000.00 per occurrence, \$100,000.00 aggregate limit property damage liability insurance. Should any policy be canceled, the City shall be notified of such cancellation within 10 days after such cancellation is effective.

A provision requiring such notice shall be incorporated in such policy. In the event any such policy at any time fails, in the opinion of the City Clerk's Office or his/her designee, to comply with the provision hereof or to afford reasonably satisfactory protection to the persons intended to be protected, such failure shall be grounds for revocation of any such license, or in the discretion of the City Clerk's Office or his or her designee, grounds for the suspension thereof until the insurance required hereby be so furnished. It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the business defined herein while his or her license is for any reason suspended or revoked.

#### Sec. 5-1504 License Fee

The fee for every licensee to engage in this business shall be set forth in the current fee schedule for twelve (12) months. The issuance of such license shall entitle and authorize the licensee to engage in only such types of service as shown on the face of

such license. It shall be unlawful and a ground for revocation of such license, for the licensee to engage in any or other different types of service constituting all or any part or parts of such business. Renewal of such license shall be based on the current fee schedule per twelve (12) months. The fee for a license limited to dead tree removal from private property shall be set forth in the current fee schedule. Effective date of licenses shall be the first day of operation within the City.

### Sec. 5-1505 Rules and Regulations

The City Clerk's Office or his or her designee may recommend for adoption reasonable rules and regulations governing those aspects of the conduct of the business defined in Section 5-1501 hereof and of any and all parts thereof, directly affecting the public health and safety and requiring the use of such safety appliances, apparatus and equipment as are reasonably necessary for the protection of the workmen engaged therein, and the public and private property and it shall be unlawful for any licensee hereunder to violate or fail, neglect or refuse to comply with any such rules or regulations.

### Sec. 5-1506 Name and Address Displayed

All automobiles, trucks, trailers or other vehicles operated by any licensee for the transportation of the equipment used by him or her in such business and all self-propelled, draw or tow equipment used by any licensee in such business shall have the name and address of such licensee displayed on both sides thereof in plain and legible figures and letters not less than three (3) inches in height which shall be kept in such condition as to permit the same to be readily distinguished and read at a distance of at least sixty (60) feet. It shall be unlawful and a ground for revocation of his or her license for any licensee to operate any such vehicle or cause any such equipment to be operated or drawn or towed upon the streets, alleys or any public ways or places within the City unless or without the same being so displayed thereon.

**SECTION 2. AMEND.** This ordinance shall amend Chapter 5, Article 15 of the Lansing City Code.
